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HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL INFORMATION

The Lemon Building was built in 1891, Nathan C. Wyeth, architect. It was a four-and-a-half story brick commercial building with a four bay front and a modified gable roof. The facade was highlighted by an intricate design in cast brick. It was demolished in 1971 for the new American Institute of Architects headquarters. See Nancy B.
