- Significance: The U.S. Naval Base at Pearl Harbor was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1964. As a Category I structure, it has been determined that Building No. 413 constituted a prominent element of the National Historic Landmark and played a major role in the operation of the Pearl Harbor Naval Base.
- Description: Building No. 413 is a permanent single-story reinforced concrete structure located at Jarvis Street and Kuahua Avenue. The area of the building is approximately 18,700 square feet. Building No. 413 is abutted against Building No. 439 (see HABS No. H1-144).
- History: Building No. 413 was constructed in 1914 and was designed for submarine flotilla with dormitories and officers sleeping rooms. In 1919, the building was converted to a torpedoes and mines building. The building was reinforced with steel supports, concrete columns and concrete foundations for the compressors. A monorail system was also installed. The building was used for storage of torpedoes and warheads. In 1942, ten 12" thick concrete walls were constructed inside the building. More torpedoes racks were installed to increase the storage capacity. The building is currently used as a storage/tool room for Naval Supply Center. Plans for demolition of the existing building are included in Military Construction (MCON) Project P-115, which proposes to demolish the existing building and construct a new Intermediate Maintenance Activity (IMA) Facility.
