

Overall Dimensions: 42'x 68'; 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ stories
Orientation : south
Architectural Plan type : rectangular with irregular projections
Description : Foundation: coursed cut stone perimeter walls
Structure : wood frame
Ext. walls: masonite siding (prob. over beveled siding)
Roof: asphalt shingled, moderately pitched hipped roof with flared cornices; flared and pedimented cross gables on east and west sides; hipped front porch roof
Dormers: single large Palladian dormer centered on south facade
Windows: 1/1 double-hung with moulded dripcaps (first floor) or lintels let into main roof architrave
Porches: full-width, 1-story open front porch across south facade; small enclosed side porch on east
Details: boxed and moulded main roof cornices with dentils and plain block modillions; flared eaves and corbeled brick chimneys; Ionic front porch columns with turned balusters and dentiled and modillioned cornice

Construction Date : ca. 1905
Architecture Style: Neoclassical Box
Statement of Significance: Although altered somewhat by residing and the conversion from a single family residence to apartments, this large frame house displays most of its original neoclassical elements - a typical example of a relatively common architectural style for this neighborhood.
