McINTYRE CABIN. LOCATED NINE MILES FROM CHARLOTTE, N. C.
ON HIGHWAY #271.

Present occupants, W. D. Puckett and wife, have occupied the cabin for twenty-two years. The ell as shown on photograph was built previous to the occupancy of the present tenants. Built in 1728 by one of the early settlers of this section, the builder unknown.

Foundation of field stone laid dry, walls of pine logs chinked with mud, gables of rough sawn boards, all sills, joists and rafters hand hewn pine poles, roof stripped and covered with hand split oak shingles, chimney of stone and hand made bricks, floors and interior partitions of rough sawn boards, interior white washed.

Historical events connected with the cabin consists of the Battle of McIntyre Farm, which occurred on October 3rd, 1780 between the invading British forces and the Americans. The British forces consisted of six hundred men divided as follows; Four hundred and fifty infantrymen, sixty cavalrymen and forty wagons, of the above number eight were killed and twelve wounded. The American force consisted of fourteen men, none killed, none wounded. The cabin is perforated with bullet holes from this encounter.
