HISTORIC AMERICAN BUILDINGS SURVEY

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- Location: The garage is located 22 feet south-southwest of the residence.
- Significance: This structure represents one of the last buildings erected during the historic period. It is also one of only two historic structures on the property built during the Post-War Period.
- Description: Located south-southwest of the house is a novelty sided and gable roofed garage with exposed rafter tails. It measures 20 feet by 22 feet in size. It has sliding wooden doors on the front and no windows.
- History: This structure, built in 1946, is the most recent building constructed during the historic period. Along with the large cinder-block barn, it represents the final stage of construction on the farmstead complex.
