**TO ANDREW JACKSON, JR.**

Washington, June 2, 1834.

*Dear Andrew,* This moment your draft to Mr. Hill has been presented, accepted, and will be paid tomorrow, without letter of advice.

My son, why will you not learn to transact your affairs like a man of business. Why did you not, with the draft, inclose a letter of advice as I had requested and as soon thereafter send on the accounts as settled etc. etc. I have not recd. since Sarahs of the 2d ultimo, and your note which accompanied it, just saying you would write that evening, a si[n]gle line from you, nor have I heard any thing from the farm since the heavy Frosts in april last. You must be aware how anxious I am to hear from you all, and how the farm progresses.

deliver the inclosed letter and Book to our dear Sarah, and kiss her, and the two sweet little ones, for me.
