



REMARKABLE PHOTOGRAPH OF THE DESTRUCTION OF A GERMAN ZEPPELIN NEAR MONASTIR, EIGHTY-FIVE MILES NORTHWEST OF SALONIKI, BY SHELL-FIRE FROM A FRENCH AEROPLANE OPERATED BY LIEUTENANT HUGO DE COUTENANT. The side of the big German craft blew out after having been struck by a shell from the aeroplane, and it fell, rear end foremost, to the ground. Lieutenant de Coutenant was forced by engine trouble to descend and was immediately made a prisoner by the Germans. The photograph was taken from the shelter of a dugout, the silhouettes of two German officers, watching the air battle, showing in the foreground.
