Owner: Miss Hallie Claire Smith (and occupant).

Date of Erection: 1830.

Architect - Builder:

Present Condition: Good. The house was moved and turned around to face rear street where its back fence once stood. Miss Hallie Smith is gradually restoring house.

Number of Stories: Two. Faces west.

Materials of Construction: Foundation brick. Floors wood. Exterior wall wood. Interior walls, wood and plaster. Shingle roof.

Other Existing Records: A Treasure Album of Milledgeville and Baldwin County by Nelle Womack Hines, Page 38.

Additional Data: Inherited by Dr. Wm. A. Jarrett from his father. Five generations of this family lived here. Wm. Sinclair Scott married Annie Eliza Jarrett, daughter of Dr. Wm. A. Jarrett.

Called the Cedars because of a curved driveway with cedars on each side. Gardens were laid out by Irish Gardner, Mr. Patrick Kane.

Information furnished by Miss Hallie Claire Smith: - Wide central hall with circular stairway; the wall flanking stairway curves with it; the walnut handrail is unbroken and curves over itself. A palladian motif at each end of upstairs hall. Miss Smith says she has been told Mr. Howard Smith, who was married to a Miss Ravenel of Charleston, S.C., planned the house and designed the gardens.
