SIGNIFICANCE

generally two-story brick and frame structures with little ornamentation. 1102-1112 Oak Street, which is larger in scale than most such buildings, contained businesses on the first floor and apartments on the second. Original occupants of the storefronts included a druggist, grocer, barber, tailor and dry goods store.
