Then I shall sing them all and secure my English copyright. The last time I went to America I thought I would be clever. 'The Sad Sea Waves,' 'Rotten Row,' and 'The Little Man'selle' were all safely locked up in my trunks, and I did not even dare to hum them before we were out at sea. In this way I hoped to keep my songs brand new for England on my return. I was in America only two months, but when I got home I found that all three songs were being sung all over the place, in spite of the fact that I had the exclusive rights to them. Some English singer who was playing in New York had heard me sing them, and got over to London a month ahead of me."

Str Henry Irving having distributed the "parts" of "Cymbeline," has dismissed his company for a short vacation. The players will be recalled in August and begin rehearsals of that play for the autumn production at the Royal Lyceum Theatre. During the past week or more Sir Henry Irving has taken advantage of the presence in London of the Boston Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company to extend many pleasant courtesies to some of his American friends. In order to enhance the comfort of his roof garden patrons, Oscar Hammerstein has provided another means of letting the public down from the roof to the street. It is a marble stairway, which, starting at the left of the tier of boxes in the centre of the roof, was cut through several floors to lead to the sidewalk at the northern end of the building on the Broadway side.

COOL THINGS TO DRINK. New Yorkers, Men and Women, Imbibe an Enormous Quantity of Hot Weather Comforters.

The past week was a great week for the soda water business. The amount of drinks sold in the way of sodas, phosphates and nerve tonics was something astonishing. One downtown drug store centrally located sold on an average ten thousand drinks a day during the entire week.

The best selling drinks are the ones which are the best known. The hot, thirsty customer, as a rule, who is in a hurry, prefers a drink with which he is familiar in preference to one which he has never tasted before and may not like.

The two rival drinks sold over the soda water counter are orange phosphate and egg phosphate. In the shopping district as many as a thousand glasses of orange phosphate are sold a day and when one considers the fondness of women for ice cream soda, this speaks very well for the popularity of the phosphate.

Another drink much in favor this season is Concord grape juice. The women like it as it is a slight stimulant and yet in no sense intoxicating. Celery phosphate is a new drink with which the weary shopper frequently revives herself. It is considered an excellent nerve tonic.

Watermelon soda is a novelty this year, also coconut soda. Chocolate walnut is a strange concoction which is declared to be a very popular drink with women. That they live to slug it's prices only goes to prove their capacity for standing hum. It is a sweetened soda water composed of the juice of walnuts and a chocolate syrup.

Almond cream is another soda water high in favor. Sherbert is new and much drunk. It is made of three syrups—pineapple, raspberry and orange skilfully mixed. Of course the devotion of women to ice cream sodas is an old story. They are ready to drink it morning, noon and night. And it has come to be as much a part of their life as it is to use one perfume in preference to all others. All the fruit syrups are in constant demand, and maple and chocolate are both popular flavors.

There are men who patronize the soda water fountains, and there are men who don't. For the men who don't a "Minnie Burns" is a new and refreshing Summer drink. Here is the way it is made: Put into a tall, thin glass two ounces of powdered sugar, a little lime juice, a wineglass of brandy, two or three raspberries and a piece each of orange and pineapple. Fill the glass half way up with cracked ice, then slowly decant and stir into it ice cold soda until it is full to the brim.

A "Pinafore" is another new and cooling drink much in vogue downtown. It is a skilful mixture of Medford rum, lemon juice, sugar and crushed fruit. In extreme heat it is said to be a great reviver. Something new in the way of an after-dinner settler is made of equal portions of cream de cocoa, curaco and brandy, served in small glasses with cracked ice. Then there is a new Summer morning appetizer which is warranted to make a man open his eyes, to aid him in getting dressed and to prompt him to ask for another one. It is a cocktail made of whiskey and vermouth, with a few dashes of orange bits and cayenne.
