

ROCK HER ON THE WEDDING DAY.

Mrs. Yarde-Buller Says Her Husband Was Brutal from the First.

Fortune Hunting Englishman Flew in a Rage Because She Had No Money.

TOLD HER TO "GO IN THE STREET."

He Frequently Abandoned Her, and Once Hastily Returned When He Heard She Was an Heiress—As to Gadesden.

London, July 28.—The Yarde-Buller divorce case trails its disagreeable course in court with multiplying revelations of the misfortunes that came to American girls who marry abroad for the privilege of acquiring fortune hunters.

Thus began a ten-days' honeymoon in the country. He was declared bankrupt in 1888, and she went to California. He followed, and they camped in the woods two months, her father, General Kirkham, providing money.

In 1891 he left her in America for ten months, and then he rejoined her. They returned to England, and he soon left her for ten weeks, because, he said, she was so vile he could not live with her.

Returned for Money.

About that time a newspaper printed a paragraph stating that she had been left a fortune, so Yarde-Buller returned to her and was constantly wondering when remittances would come.

Her husband had taken her by the hair of her head, and frequently swore at her. Once he kicked her in the side, and afterward she left the house.

She admitted hitting him with a fire rake, but this was on account of his conduct. She never struck a man before and hoped never to have to strike another.

Her Acquaintance With Gadesden.

As to the co-respondent, Gadesden, she denied that she ever addressed him as "Val, dear." She said Gadesden came to England simply and solely as her agent to arrange her affairs and protect her from the violence of Yarde-Buller.

GREEKS JOIN GREEKS.

Forty Patriots to Leave This Country and Fight the Hated Sultan in Crete.

Three years ago Zerracos was a captain in the regular army of Greece. He came to America and bought a restaurant at No. 16 Roosevelt street.

A month ago Zerracos announced his intention to return to Crete and offering his services to the revolutionary party, every Greek in the place joined him in his determination.

LITTLE GIRL ALL WELTS AND BRUISES.

Beaten by Her Adopted Parents, Who First Prayed with Her.

Ill-Used Child Said She "Wanted to Die and Go to Heaven."

MOTHER GETS HER DAUGHTER BACK.

Neighbors Fed the Hungry Sufferer and Say That Often They Have Heard Her Cries When She Was Whipped.

With her tender body showing welts and bruises covering her from the waist to the knees, ten-year-old Martha Harriman, daughter of Amanda Harriman, a widow living in Phillipsburg, was brought before Justice of the Peace Krebs in Arlington, N. J., yesterday afternoon.

Warren is a stenographer to the Collector of the Port, and has an office in the Custom House in Wall street.

Mrs. Harriman, about a year ago, gave her child's name for adoption to Superintendent Lamb, of the New Jersey Children's Society.

Mrs. C. L. Edmonds, one of the neighbors of the Warrens, testified that she had heard the child beaten frequently.

She said the child was starved, and that grease and dirt was rubbed on Martha's face, and that she had often given the little one food from her own table.

Miss Etta Hall, also a neighbor, swore that she had seen Mrs. Warren scrape the soot and grease from the bottom of a kettle and cover the girl's face with it, and then make her sit on a chair for hours without moving.

On the suggestion of Justice Krebs, the little one disrobed in a rear room and showed the welts and bruises which she had received last Friday.

She concluded by swearing that she had heard the whipping given by Mr. Warren on Friday night and that she thought the child was being murdered.

Each time I have been forced to punish her I have first talked and then prayed with her. I used a piece of harness strap which we had and which we had selected as the best thing to use.

The justice gave Martha back to the custody of her mother, and fined Warren \$10 and costs.
