Denied Strikers Writs. Judge Noble Refuses Injunctions for the Locked Out Men and Against the Brown Company.

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 12.—Judge Noble delivered his decision to-day in the injunction suit filed by William Stanley, one of the Brown Hoisting Works locked out men, to compel Mayor McKisson to remove the militia from the works of the company, and to restrain the Brown Company from arming its men.

The application to prevent the Brown Company from arming its employees was denied, because the company denied having any intention of arming their men, and the motion to compel the Brown Company to fulfill its agreement with the men was denied because, Judge Noble said, the Court did not feel justified in enforcing a personal contract of that character.

Judge Noble read the law vesting the Mayor with discretionary power to summon troops to aid the civil authorities, and said the judicial power could not interfere with the Mayor's power to exercise discretionary power, but could control the discretion when the officer abused and transcended his power.

BOATMEN FIGHT THE FERRY. Claim That the Patchogue Company Has Interfered with Their Business.

Patchogue, L. I., Aug. 12.—There is a brilliant prospect of a lively war between the Patchogue steam ferry company and the local boatmen who ferry to Water Island. The Patchogue ferry company, which was incorporated last year to run from Patchogue to Point of Woods this season, branched out further and added Cherry Grove and Fire Island to its list of stopping stations on the beach. Recently, to accede to the public demands, the steamboat company instituted a Wednesday evening excursion to Water Island. This latest move has been resisted by the boatmen, who claim the evening excursions interfere with their business.

There are over twenty sailboats engaged in the daily traffic between Water Island and Patchogue, the fare for the round trip being twenty-five cents. INVALID FAINTED AFTER THE CEREMONY.

Pretty Romance Which Ended in the Happy Union of Dr. William S. Gotthell and Viola Spindler Sheppard.

Miss Viola Spindler Sheppard, of No. 137 East Seventy-second street, was married last Tuesday while ill in bed to Dr. William S. Gotthell.

The bride had been in a hospital for weeks, and her life had been despaired of. She had been faithfully attended by her devoted lover until recovery was certain. Unwilling to have the original date of the wedding changed, Miss Sheppard decided to have the ceremony performed Tuesday, and was removed from the hospital for that purpose.

Dr. Gotthell is the son of the Rev. Gustav Gotthell, rabbi of the Temple Emanuel, who married them. For years the Doctor had been engaged to the young woman. Last Spring the wedding was announced to take place on August 11.

Her illness developed into appendicitis, and Dr. Gotthell decided she must be removed from her home. He took her to Miss Anna Alston's private sanitarium, at No. 137 West Forty-seventh street. In the removal she was injured slightly. An operation was decided upon as a last resort. She passed through it safely, but it left her in a critical condition, and Dr. Gotthell was constantly by her bedside.

When she began to recover she expressed a wish that the marriage should take place on the day appointed, and it was decided to have the ceremony in Dr. Gotthell's home, No. 37 East Fifty-fifth street. Dr. Gotthell, accompanied by a trained nurse, removed her in a carriage. She was weak from the effects of the trip, and was put immediately to bed. After she recovered from her fatigue the marriage ceremony was performed.

PAUPERIZED HIMSELF FOR A GIRL'S SAKE.

Gave All His Money to a Young Woman in His Charge So That She Could Land.

THEN HE WAS SENT BACK TO EUROPE.

Franz Biskup Undertook to See Bertha Seidler Safely to This Country and Did So to His Own Exclusion.

Franz Biskup came all the way from Germany to America with a young girl who was a friend of his family in his charge, and then had to go all the way back as a pauper because he generously gave her his money so as to render her eligible to admittance to this country.

It all came about in this way: Franz has a wife and five children in Germany, and they live near a town called Seidler, a pretty girl, twenty-two years of age, who lived in the same town as he did. When Franz decided to come to America it was thought to be a good opportunity to put Bertha in his care, as she was coming, too. So they embarked in company on the Albano, which arrived in this port a few days ago. Their names appeared side by side on the ship's passenger list and they were always seen together aboard the ship and on Ellis Island after they reached this country.

The Ellis Island officials became inquisitive, and asked questions which made Franz think that he had compromised Bertha's good name. He suddenly began to think that everything would be all right if he said that he and she were engaged to be married, so when the officials examined him he swore that Bertha was soon to be his bride. The girl supported him in this statement.

But after a time the officials, who did not believe the story, made Franz tell the truth—that Bertha was simply a family friend, who had come to this country in his care. This, however, did not fully clear away all difficulties, for the girl did not have sufficient money, Franz had \$25 left out of his savings, and he generously gave this to Bertha and bade her be of good cheer. The sum made the girl eligible for admittance to the Land of the Free, and in time she was sent to her aunt in Lake Forest, Ill.

But Franz had pauperized himself by his kindly act, and he could not give the gates of freedom. Under the law the Ellis Island officials were compelled to deport him as a pauper, and yesterday he was sent home on the Steamer Purst Bismarck.

ELLIS ISLAND EXTENSION. Two and a Half Acres to Be Added to the Immigrants' Landing Place.

Two and a half acres of land are to be added to Ellis Island. Its hospital at present is built over shallow water and rests on piling. Commissioner General of Immigration Stump came from Washington on Tuesday last to arrange for the extension, and also to examine the contracts for the Ellis Island ferry service.

Mr. Stump said yesterday that the improvements would cost about \$25,000. All the bids, fifteen in number, are in. They range from \$17,000 to \$30,000. They have been forwarded to Washington, and Mr. Stump will return in a few days and announce the successful contractor.

Work on the second story for the dormitory is progressing rapidly. The addition will accommodate 250 persons, and will be supplied with baths enabling from fifteen to twenty persons to be bathed at one time.
