GIVES A HOUSE IN PART PAYMENT.

Big Borrowers in the Market—Other Sales of Mortgages and Transfers Registered Yesterday.

Auction sales were the feature of the real estate market yesterday. In the New York Salesroom three auctioneers disposed of seven different pieces of property at fair advantage, despite a slim attendance.

One of the pieces of property was the four-story house at No. 472 West End avenue, which was knocked down to Thomas B. Stokes, a coal dealer, for \$23,600, after strong competition.
