TYNAN'S ARREST REVEALS A PLOT.

Anarchists, Nihilists and Fenians in an Alliance.

Conspired to Strike at the Czar While He Visited the Queen.

Dynamite Was to Have Been Used, Say Scotland Yard Men.

It Is Also Said the Plotters Formed Their Plans in the City of New York.

TWO MORE "SUSPECTS" ARRESTED.

Allies of "No. 1" Captured in Rotterdam. Bomb Factory Also Discovered—Tynan Arraigned at Boulogne—May Not Be Extradited.

London, Sept. 14.—A news agency says that the plot in which it is charged Tynan, Bell, Wallace and Kearney were implicated was hatched in the United States, and that it was widespread in its ramifications, not only in England, but in various Continental countries.

The conspiracy was started months ago, and, although those connected with it thought they were working with the utmost secrecy, so far as the authorities were concerned, there were among the plotters two or three agents of the British Government, who kept the London police advised of every move that was made or proposed by the conspirators from the very inception of the plot.

The police here knew even the names of the men who were selected by the American Revolutionary Society to cause explosions in England and on the Continent. It was well known that ever since the defeat of the Irish Home Rule bill the physical force party had been active in the spread of its propaganda, and steps were at once taken to closely but secretly watch those who, it was anticipated, would be likely to enter into a conspiracy against the Government.

British Agents in America.

Thus the fact of the conspiracy was learned, the British agents in the United States completely denuding the chief plotters into the belief that they were bitter enemies of the English Government, and would go to any lengths to secure the freedom of Ireland.

It was learned that the conspirators were in alliance with the Fenians, Anarchists and Nihilists, and that they were all working together. The Nihilists, who do not appear to have been specially interested in freeing Ireland from the British yoke, subscribed funds and dynamite for the leaders, but only on the express condition that "business" should be done on the Continent.

The visit of the Czar and Czarina to the Queen at Balmoral and their subsequent journey to France were deemed by the Nihilists to be the most suitable occasions on which to attempt the lives of their imperial majesties of Russia. The donors to the fund in America, however, insisted that a blow should first be struck at England. It can be stated in this connection that Inspector Melville recently went to Paris, where, it is supposed, he conferred with the police as to the best means of circumventing the plans of the conspirators.

English Newspapers Deceived.

At that time the English papers were not aware of the existence of the plot, and in their comments on the Inspector's journey to Paris they stated, while pointing out the existence in London of a large Anarchist colony, that the Czar would without doubt be far safer in England, without any police protection, than he would be in Paris with all the safeguards that might be adopted by the police of that city. The result of the knowledge obtained by the police does not appear to bear the claims made by the newspapers.

It is stated that the conspirators, before they left the United States, were taught how to mix chemicals to form high explosives and the use of clockwork to cause explosions. Their teacher was a Russian professor, through him the Nihilists and Fenians were brought together, and it was due to his efforts that the alliance between them was entered into.

The police here in their investigations early learned that the magazine of the plotters was located at Berchem, a suburb of Antwerp, and when the plans for the arrest were complete, the authorities of that city were notified, and an attempt was made to arrest the men in the house where the explosives were stored. This, however, failed, but it is thought almost certain that the two men, Kearney and Haines, alias Wallace, who were arrested at Rotterdam, are the Irishmen who lived in the house at Berchem.

Plotters at Work in Glasgow.

Kearney sent Bell to Glasgow for the purpose of sounding the physical force party there as to their willingness to resort to the use of dynamite.

It has been learned that while Tynan was in Paris he associated with notorious Anarchists and Nihilists. He always had plenty of money, which he spent freely among his associates. He was voted a "good fellow," but there were those among his companions who did not approve of his air of braggadocio and threats of vengeance against England. It was thought that he did altogether too much talking, and he was several times warned that his tongue would get him in trouble with the police if he did not put a curb upon it. It is not expected that Tynan will be extradited until the conclusion of the Czar's visit to France.

Great praise is awarded to Inspector Melville for his work in shadowing and arresting the conspirators. It is believed that his work has put the quietus on a plot that, had it been successful, would have been far-reaching in its results, and which would have made matters worse for Ireland, instead of bettering her condition.

The leading members of the Nationalist party emphatically disavow any sympathy with the physical force party, whose ideas they characterize as chimerical and tending to undo whatever advance has been made in the Irish cause within recent years.

The Government's Statement.

A communication of a semi-official character was issued this afternoon touching the arrest of the alleged dynamite conspirators. The communication says, among other things, that the Scotland Yard officials have been fully aware for some time past that a gang of desperadoes has been engaged in America in preparing the details and arranging the ramifications of an extensive and diabolical plot to perpetrate a

MAINE SWEEP BY REPUBLICANS.

They Claim Over 50,000 Plurality in the State.

Poll a Full Party Vote and Make Gains Over the Vote of 1894.

Democrats Also Increase Their Vote Over That of Two Years Ago.

The "Gold" Ticket Cut but a Small Figure in the Day's Contest

VICTORS GAINED IN THE CITIES.

force voted the Republican ticket. I think they have not done so as generally predicted.

The Democratic gold vote is insignificant, one reason being that they had to use pasters to vote at all. They did not get names enough to fulfil the law so as to get on the ballot. The Republican majority will exceed 40,000, according to all the figures carefully considered, and there is a probability that it will reach 45,000.

The Republicans meant as a precaution to compare the vote with that in the last Presidential year, but no one has attempted to do that. All the comparisons are on the vote of two years ago, when the Republicans gained 40,000. With one-third of the State (two hundred towns) heard from, the gain on the phenomenal Republican majority of two years ago, is for Governor 7,488, and the Democratic candidate gains over two years ago, 1,131.

Cause of Weakness in 1894.

Two years ago the vote showed great weakness in the Democratic party and was attributed to two causes—the dissatisfaction of the Democrats with the disbursement of patronage by the Administration and the disgust of the out Greenbackers with Cleveland's course in favor of the gold standard. The Democratic vote fell remarkably low, and the hopes of the regulars of the party have been that they might this time reach their high water mark of sixty thousand, but they have fallen far short of it, falling below forty thousand.

The wisdom of the Republican organizer and leader, Manley, is justified in his assertion that the Republicans could not possibly cast more than 80,000 votes of their own. The unknown quantity was what the Democrats who would not vote to help Bryan and Sewall would do. They have taken the course of not voting at all, while the Republican vote is out in full force.




THE OLDEST DAUGHTER LIVING IN AMERICA.

WILL HILL BE FOR THE TICKET?

Elliott Danforth and John C. Sheehan Call at Wolfert's Roost.

Believe That the Senator's Views Will Be Embodied in the Platform.

This Being Done, the Way is Clear for His Support of the Chicago Nominees.

It Is Stated That Chairman Jones Sent a Message to Hill Which Bore Fruit.

SWEPT HER INTO THE SEA.

An Unknown Young Woman Washed Off a Rock at Narragansett Pier and Drowned.

Narragansett Pier, R. I., Sept. 14.—The first drowning accident of the season occurred at the pier to-day, and the affair is wrapped in mystery, as the identity of the unfortunate young woman who lost her life has not been revealed.

She was sitting reading on the rocks, off Ocean Road, opposite Howard Lapsley's

cottage, when a big wave suddenly rolled in upon her and swept her into the sea. Miss Morrison, a cottager, saw the accident and called for assistance. Three men launched a boat and went to the young woman's rescue, but she was unconscious when her body was recovered.

Drs. Buckler, of Baltimore, and Hitchcock, of New York, applied restoratives until 8 o'clock to-night, when life was pronounced extinct.

The drowned woman was a brunette, and was attired in a dark gown.

The Dynamite Plot and Phoenix Park Tragedy.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 14.—All is not over between Senator Hill and Bryan and Sewall if the circumstances surrounding Elliott Danforth's visit to Senator Hill this afternoon, and Mr. Danforth's conversation and attitude afterward are to be taken as significant.

Mr. Danforth once before visited Senator Hill, and following soon came the Hill dinner to Mr. Bryan. To-day Mr. Danforth was on his way to Buffalo and in his pocket was a draft of the platform of the Democratic State Convention, which had been shown to Chairman Jones, of the Democratic National Committee, and his suggestions taken. Mr. Danforth drove from the train to Wolfert's Roost and talked an hour with the Senator.

Mr. Danforth would not divulge the nature of his errand, nor anything that was said, but the deduction is that Senator Jones sent a message to Senator Hill, and that the platform has been altered to suit Senator Hill's views, and that Senator Hill will adhere to his plan previously formed, to do what he could in framing the platform to suit his own views and those of many others, and then come out with an endorsement of Bryan and Sewall.

John C. Sheehan Also Calls.

To make the position stronger, John C. Sheehan came to town to-night at 9:35 on his way to Buffalo, and with a quickness that smacked of a desire to avoid being seen, jumped into Senator Hill's cab and was driven rapidly to Wolfert's Roost. Mr. Sheehan was caught as he flew to the cab, but he had nothing to say. A Democrat high in State politics who came on the train with Mr. Sheehan said his visit was most important.

"Sheehan," said he, "is the man who will dominate the Buffalo convention, and he comes to consult with the power that has in the past controlled Democratic conventions. This means much. From remarks that I have heard I believe that Senator Hill has found a way to remain a Democrat. He has with Danforth gone over the platform and made suggestions. Now comes Sheehan to bind the affair before he goes to Buffalo to give his suggestions at the convention."

MANLEY IN JUBILANT MOOD.

He Claims Maine for the Republicans by a Plurality of 50,000, and Thanks Democrats for Their Aid.

Augusta, Me., Sept. 14.

To W. R. Hearst, New York Journal:

The Republican party has achieved this day the most sweeping and magnificent victory ever accorded to any party in the history of Maine.
