

LOST BONDS ARE FOUND.

Mrs. Irving's Securities Recovered, but the Mystery of Their Disappearance Remains. Were Reported Missing from a Security Vault, but Later Were Discovered There.

DAUGHTER SAYS THEY WERE NOT LOST

Senator Lexow, Mrs. Irving's Lawyer, However, Refuses to Confirm This Statement—What an Official of the Security Company Says.

There appears to be almost as much mystery surrounding the recovery of \$20,000 worth of bonds belonging to Mrs. Isabelle J. Irving as over their supposed loss on December 23. They were reported missing from the box used in common by Mrs. Irving and her eldest daughter, Evangeline, in the Lincoln Safe Deposit Company's vaults.

There appears to be almost as much mystery surrounding the recovery of \$20,000 worth of bonds belonging to Mrs. Isabelle J. Irving as over their supposed loss on December 23. They were reported missing from the box used in common by Mrs. Irving and her eldest daughter, Evangeline, in the Lincoln Safe Deposit Company's vaults.

THE DISAPPEARING BONDS.

No further examination of the safety deposit box has been made until yesterday. According to Senator Lexow, he relied upon the word of Mrs. Irving that the bonds were missing, which, she says, was corroborated by the statement of Mr. Van Worman, manager of the Lincoln Safe Deposit Company, that he had looked into the box and could not see the bonds.

She returned to this city on Tuesday last, and yesterday morning, accompanied by her sister, Isabelle, and Mr. Tilden, Westcott, Lexow, McKellar & Wells, she visited the vault and found the securities there, wrapped up with certain insurance papers and other documents, in a copy of an old newspaper.

After the first demonstrations of delight Miss Isabelle Irving herself wrote the following statement, which she requested that it should be published over the signature of Lexow, McKellar & Wells:

To the Public—You are hereby advised that the bonds and other securities in the safe in the Lincoln Safe Deposit Company's vault, and which were believed by Mrs. Isabelle Irving to have been lost, were found in the safe in which they were originally placed there by Mrs. Irving in the month of December, 1895.

It may be remarked that at the time of the finding of her expressions of regret Mrs. Irving was presumably in the possession of the recovery of her valuable securities.

WHAT SENATOR LEXOW SAYS. The firm of Lexow, McKellar & Wells subsequently refused to sign the statement for publication. Senator Lexow said yesterday:

"We cannot sign the statement because we have no proof that the papers have been in the safe since they were originally placed there by Mrs. Irving. It is in a position to authoritatively state what is or was the condition of Mrs. Irving's health. We have not seen her since she reported her loss. The day following the loss of the bonds she came down here and I certainly understood her to say that she had been unable to find the bonds in the box in which she had seen the usual receipt of the date on which it had been opened."

WOMAN SLOWLY BURNED.

Her Gown Caught Fire—Wrapped in Blankets, the Half-Smothered Flames Ate into Her Flesh.

Mrs. Sarah Sarbach was fearfully burned at her home, No. 93 Bergen street, Brooklyn, yesterday, and her life is despaired of. Her husband, Frank Sarbach, worked heroically to save her from injury, and in doing so was burned about the face and body.

The Sarbachs lived on the second floor of their house, which is a double four-story brick flat, tenanted by eight families. Mrs. Sarbach arose at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and began to prepare breakfast. She placed a plate of butter on the mantelpiece above the range.

Mr. Sarbach ran to the kitchen carrying a blanket with him and threw it around his wife. He then completely covered her with blankets. To his horror Mr. Sarbach discovered that the flames were burning. Again he seized his wife and carried her to the house of a neighbor next door.

BOY BURGLARS WITH ALIASES.

"Red" Trask Was Arrested for Talking Too Much and Confessed.

Detectives Titus, Schermer and McCafferty, of the Morrisania Station, arrested Thomas Trask, alias "Red" Trask, seventeen years old, of One Hundred and Forty-second street and Willis avenue; George Smith, alias "Yellow Kittens," eighteen years old, of No. 309 East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and John Duncan, alias "Dunc," fifteen years old, of No. 100 East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, on Friday night on a charge of having burglarized the Beehive store, at Nos. 212 and 215 Willis avenue, on Christmas Eve.

The three young men, according to the detectives, who shadowed them, were confidingly called "hoodlums" and "burglars" since the reign of crime set in in this city.

Principally on account of his talking in this way Trask was arrested. He confessed his guilt and implicated the other two, who were found at the Olympia. Smith and Duncan deny the charge. The three prisoners were held in \$1,000 bail in the Morrisania Court yesterday.

MCDONALD STAYS IN JAIL.

Special Sessions's Chief Clerk Unable to Get the Required \$10,000 Bail.

Left Many Debts in Binghamton, Where He Had the Reputation of Being a Gambler.

JUSTICES MAKE A STATEMENT.

The Alleged Embezzler Insisted That He Had Enough Money in the Bank to Make Good the Deficiency, but This Was False.

Notwithstanding the persistent efforts of his counsel, Theodore F. McDonald, Chief Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, and to remain in a Tombs cell last night, in default of \$10,000 bail. He refused to be seen yesterday, and his lawyer, Abraham Levy, said that McDonald would not make any statement for a day or two.

The charge against McDonald is grand larceny, in devoting to his own use a little over \$4,000 of the city's money in his custody, yet no man was ever more highly recommended for public office than was McDonald when he applied to Mayor Strong for appointment as a Justice of the Court of Special Sessions, or as a Magistrate in the Police Courts. Judges, politicians, ministers and citizens generally indorsed his application in the warmest terms, and failing to secure the appointment, the men whom Mayor Strong did appoint as Justices gladly selected him as Chief Clerk of their courts.

The indorsements of Dr. Chauncey M. Depew, General Wagner Swayne, Judges of the Supreme Court, and others were equally flattering. All of these persons are now wondering how they could have been so mistaken in the man, McDonald lived at No. 157 West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, in a line of furnished flats, with his wife and grown daughter. One of his sons is a student at Yale, and another is in the University of Michigan.

LEFT DEBTS IN BINGHAMTON.

Since he came here from Binghamton, ten years ago, he has had a law office at No. 280 Broadway, with a fair practice. He left a great many debts in Binghamton, which he had been District-Attorney of Broome County for two terms, but his life here has not been extravagant. In Binghamton he had the reputation of being a gambler, and it is thought that the money he had accumulated in the city was lost at poker. This money was part of the fines collected by him as clerk of the Court of Special Sessions.

McDonald brought out the fact that, although his bond is only \$10,000, McDonald sometimes had in his possession funds of the city amounting to the same sum. On August 1st he was in the Court of Special Sessions fined \$28,000. This money McDonald placed in the Franklin National Bank in his own name, and he has since each month he would turn it over, according to law, to the Comptroller. Of late he had become tardy in making his returns, and it is supposed that he had been short several times and waited until the collections of the succeeding month amounted to enough to make up the amount due.

McDonald demonstrated his inability for an executive position, and the fact that he was in the court was done by William M. Fuller, the deputy clerk. Mr. Fuller would receive the fines and turn them over to McDonald, taking in return the money he would need to carry on his business. Mr. McDonald was severely reprimanded for conducting business in that way, and he has since been ordered to make up to date each month he would turn it over, according to law, to the Comptroller. Of late he had become tardy in making his returns, and it is supposed that he had been short several times and waited until the collections of the succeeding month amounted to enough to make up the amount due.

THE JUSTICES' STATEMENT. During the last week in December the Justices of the Special Sessions appointed Justices Hinsdale and Holbrook a committee to examine the books of the Clerk of the Court. At that time no suspicion rested in the mind of any one of the Justices that there was anything wrong about the money in the bank. The examination was simply to make a general examination as to the methods of conducting business in the office.
