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M'INTYRE BREAKS A RECORD.

In the Hermann Murder Trial He Gets a Jury and Closes in Six Hours.

In the trial of Louis Hermann for the murder of his wife, Mary, before Justice Martin J. Keogh, in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court, yesterday, Assistant District-Attorney McIntyre broke the record for presenting a capital case to the jury.

Hermann is a cripple and lived with his young wife at No. 304 East One Hundred and Fifth street. For the lack of some cigars and liquors, Hermann was sent to the penitentiary for a year, and during the time of his incarceration, it is said, his wife lavished her affections on another.

Early in July Hermann was released, and when he met his wife she declared that she loathed him. He had lost an eye while on Blackwell's Island, and she told him he was repulsive to her. She refused to return to him, and the next day, according to testimony adduced at the trial, he returned and shot her three times. She died in Bellevue Hospital.

Gunther Held for Trial. William Gunther, a directory canvasser, who was arrested on complaint of Frank Brooker, of Brooker & Chapman, expert accountants, of No. 150 Nassau street, was held for trial yesterday on the charge of swindling.

Mr. Brooker said he signed a contract to pay \$2 to have his firm's card put in a business directory. When the contract was presented for payment Thursday the amount, Mr. Brooker claims, had been raised to \$20. He had Gunther, the man who tried to collect the money, arrested.

Denman Thompson Failed to Pay. The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court handed down a decision yesterday, ordering a new trial in the suit of Henry Wayne Ellis against Denman Thompson for \$5,000 for falling to properly produce the play, "Rich and Poor," written by Ellis, in which the writer was to receive \$100 a

week until he had reached the total of the sum sued for. The new trial was ordered because the plaintiff was not allowed, in the first hearing of the case, to produce expert testimony on the merits of the play, and the case was dismissed without a jury.
