

AN ELECTRIC THEATRE.

Plans Now Under Way for Entirely New and Novel Play Houses in Boston and London.

Boston, March 18.—A theatrical project is on foot in this city for an electrical theatre, which will be duplicated in London. The originator of the idea is Mr. Oscar W. Rogers, of Chicago. In 1895 he had a long conference with Wilson Barrett, and interested him deeply in his project. Mr. Rogers also interested the late Eugene Field in the scheme.

When Mr. Rogers came to Boston he sought out Edward E. Rose, the former manager of the Castle Garden Theatre. Mr. Rose was at that time in London, but the proposition was made to the owners of the property to take a five-year lease. The proposition was not accepted, and Mr. Rose, resigning his position as manager of the Castle Square, began to look for a new theatre. The plans, as far as matured at present, are as follows:

Wilson Barrett, who has made an immense sum of money in England with his new play "The Cross," is to be financially interested, also Mr. Rose and Mr. Rogers. It is proposed to erect two theatres, one in the Cross, the other in Boston and the other at the West End of London. A site has already been selected in Boston, at the corner of the Park Square station of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad, which will be vacated when the Southern Union station is completed. The building will be very handsome one, will only require re-erecting on the interior, a portion of the stage house being used for the electric lighting. The head house will remain pretty much as it is at present for the auditorium. Mr. Rogers will erect a new building, which will be used for the electric lighting. The peculiarity of the theatres lies in the way in which they are operated. Mr. Rogers, who is reputed to be very wealthy, has a series of inventions applicable to stage uses. He proposes to operate nearly everything in the theatre by electricity. The drops, borders, curtains, both green and act, the side scenes and, in fact, every mechanism in the theatre, will be operated by the pulling and hauling of stage hands, which will be moved by the electrician at the prompt wish. This will be accomplished by a series of small but powerful electric motors, each working on an independent circuit and all within easy control of the electrician. These Mr. Rogers proposes to accomplish scenic effects with electricity. Sunset and dawn, the glare of noonday, lightning and thunder, rain and snow, light and, indeed, every possible atmospheric condition. Illumination, both in the theatre and in the city, will be accomplished in an entirely new and novel manner, and some beautiful effects secured. There will also be electric doors, entrances and exits, and the stage hands will be limited to the property men and a few assistants, necessary to arrange the props.

Federal Supervision. Senator Frye's bill establishing a department of commerce and elevating its head to the dignity of a cabinet portfolio is not likely to become a law right away.
