

AND A WEEK HAS... ONLY ONE-SIXTH AS MUCH TRADING IN WALL STREET AS A YEAR AGO.

No Other Explanation Offered Than an Exaggerated Fear of Free Silver.

BUGABOO SCARCELY UNDERSTOOD.

Financiers Rejoice, Whichever Way It May Go, That the Question is Soon to Be Set Squarely Before the Country.

The political situation still continues the absorbing topic in Wall Street. It presses all attempts at speculation. A favorable development comes along—the absence of gold engagements for export, a magnificent report by the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, a fresh break in foreign exchange, or a jump in wheat—and a wary trader buys a few hundred shares of stocks. Then some one says "free silver," or "straddle," and the disgusted trader makes haste to sell his few hundred shares. Such is the history of the stock market for one week.

The total transactions for the week were scarcely larger than was recorded for one year ago. When the transactions are eliminated which are really "washes" making up the manipulation of stocks controlled by cliques, it is doubtful whether the genuine sales of stocks for the past week exceeded 200,000 shares. It is quite certain that the majority of Stock Exchange houses last week scarcely made profits enough to pay one respectable clerk's salary. Meantime the fierce battle between silver and gold is being fought out in Wall Street with as much energy as it is in the West and South. The man who dares to intimate that silver is not such a bugbear as Wall Street makes out is pounced upon as an enemy of a thousand names. The Street is getting very bitter over this silver question, and is sincere in its belief that free silver means utter financial ruin for every man, woman and child in the country. The free silver man in the West who believes about "goldbugs of Wall Street," "sharks," "bloodsuckers," etc., finds his match in Wall Street, where cries of "traitors," "thieves" and "dishonest" are levelled at the distant heads of the silver advocates. The gold man blames all of the depression for three years upon the change against the silver, and the latter returns the charge against the gold in such cases both sides go to sword lengths. Crimination and recrimination are not arguments.

The happiest feature in the situation is the prospect that the whole question will be fought boldly and without equivocation at the polls. The dread of free silver may prove to be more paralyzing than the practice of free silver coinage. It has been overhauling the financial world for nearly six years, and has contributed its share to the panics which have broken out at intervals. The Sherman Silver Purchase act was a fearful error, it was an infantile measure, as are all compromise measures. It contained all the disadvantages of a silver basis to our currency, while it had none of the advantages of free silver, if that policy were adopted. It is hard to believe that the silver farmers could have been any worse, and the country would by this time have worked out a policy better in the throes of fear, violent invective and horrid prophesies.

TASTE FOR SILVER NOT SURPRISING. To look at the situation calmly and without prejudice, it is not surprising that the farmers of the West should have a taste of justice in the outcry of the East that it has its motive in the dishonest desire of a gold party to keep the silver farmer a debtor class. Statistics prove that the greatest portion of our mainline business is done in the West. Can a vast agricultural community that sells its billions of dollars of products annually and sells more than it buys, be content with a silver basis? This Eastern view of the free silver movement shows the inability of its critics to grasp the earnestness of the silver farmer. The situation is simple enough. The Western farmer gets about 10 cents for his oats, 12 cents for his wheat, and 15 cents for his corn. He is told that free silver will bring him higher prices. Private Sales Reach \$1,500,000 and the Auctions Aggregate \$500,000.

For the first week of June the real estate market this year compares favorably with that of previous years. In the total results at public and private selling there was but slight difference between last week and the corresponding week of 1895. The private transactions for each week reached about \$1,500,000, while the auction sales exclusive of those held on the premises aggregated about \$500,000 each week. Quite a number of voluntary auction sales took place at the downtown mart during last week, and in the main the offerings found bona fide purchasers. A few of the offerings bid in for the owners were subsequently sold privately on the basis of the final bids offered, so that the week's auction market may be regarded as an unqualified success.

Among the more interesting private transactions were those of high class dwellings west of Central Park, the exchange of the row of flats and stores at the northwest corner of Third avenue and Forty-ninth street, and the row of tenements and stores at the northeast corner of Third avenue and Ninety-fifth street, which Hermann Wronkow gives to Joseph B. Bloomingdale for property, the location of which has been advertised for sale in the West Broadway and Bleecker street corner to William Brennan.
