

NEWPORT HAS A VERY QUIET WEEK.

Newport, R. I., July 10.—The silvertides at Chelsea, assisted by the local fogs of the Aquidneck and the rains of the Narragansett, have been a little bit too much for society during the past week. Politics and society do not often conflict as they have done the past week, but when the Western silvertides are reinforced by such strong allies as rains and fog and fog and rain, the gold bugs of Newport simply stay at home and wonder if the weather can possibly get any worse. 
MUSIC AND DANCING ARE MAKING THE SEASON THE GAYEST OF THE GAY.
