

EARLE AN EXPERT AT BOARD BILL FINANCING.

Paid \$33 a Week, He Says, Although His Income Was Only \$25 a Week.

Clubman, Lawyer, Real Estate Man and Promoter in Supplementary Proceedings.

HIS WIFE IS A CO-DEFENDANT.

She Was Mrs. Chatterton and Their Joint Residence in a Flat Was the Cause of His First Wife Getting a Divorce.

Edward Earle, clubman, ex-society man, lawyer, real estate speculator, promoter of mining enterprises, and defendant two years ago in a divorce suit, again appeared yesterday in the City Court for examination in supplementary proceedings. The questions were put by John Aird Dempsey, assignee of Guy C. Dempsey, the judgment creditor, for \$685.02, issued by the City Court on May 26 against Edward Earle and Marie C. Chatterton.

The judgment is for unpaid rent of a flat in the Pallade apartment building at No. 325 West Fifty-ninth street, jointly occupied for six months by the two defendants. It was Earle's residence in this flat that formed the basis of Mrs. Clara Noble Earle's petition for divorce. After she had secured her divorce, Earle married Mrs. Chatterton. They were both in Chambers of Part III of the City Court yesterday morning, accompanied by Lawyer Larue, of the firm of Deming & Walworth, counsel in the Leslie Carter-Belasco-Fairbank trial. John Aird Dempsey and Guy C. Dempsey were the owners of the Pallade apartment building at the time the defendants lived there, and are well known in club and society circles as champion amateur oarsmen.

Edward Earle is a man of fifty-odd years, possessed of a commanding figure, a bald head and gray whiskers of formal English cut. He was dressed in a blue serge suit, negligee shirt, tan shoes and white hat, and looked prosperous. His wife is a

The clubman, lawyer, real estate speculator and promoter, and his second wife are co-defendants in supplementary proceedings brought on a judgment for unpaid rent of a flat, where they lived previous to the institution of a suit for divorce by the first Mrs. Earle, who was successful in the case. He says he now has no property and practically lives on borrowed money.

well-preserved, rather handsome woman, of apparently forty or fifty-five years. She wore a shirt waist, a blue skirt, a sailor hat and a blue veil. She and Earle conferred in whispers frequently during his examination, and neither seemed at all worried, even when Mr. Dempsey's questions pressed upon their relations before marriage.

STEPSON PAID THE RENT.

Only once did the wife show any annoyance. That was when it was attempted to bring out that she and Earle had represented themselves as brother and sister while they occupied the flat in the Pallade building, and that it was in the guise of brother that Earle signed a renewal of Mrs. Chatterton's lease, upon which he was made one of the defendants in the suit. The former hearing was held June 29 by Judge Conlan's order. At that time Earle testified that he had resided for the previous eight months at No. 124 West Ninety-first street. Walter S. Chatterton, his stepson, paid the rent of the flat, he said, and had no property, real or personal, except two or three suits of clothes, some boots, one gold and platinum ring, the gift of his wife, some underwear, two hats, a trunk and a chifferoni.

BRIDGE PLANS ADOPTED.

New East River Structure to Cost \$15,000,000, and Work on Tower Sites Can Now Be Pushed.

Plans for the approaches to the new East River Bridge, which have been so often considered and so persistently objected to by property owners on both sides of the river, were adopted, tentatively, yesterday. These plans, too, are the final ones as far as the Board is concerned.
