




He's Never Been to Reno, Nevada. He's 130 years old, has lived with one wife one hundred years, and makes his home on the shore of Lake Titicaca, South America.

She's Still a Bride at 120.—She's the wife of the Methuselah of Lake Titicaca.





It is indented with beautiful bays and coves and has numerous islands. Its greatest length is 138 miles, and its greatest breadth 69 miles—almost the size of Lake Erie.
