


A safety razor, made in Germany, was a talisman for a British non-commissioned officer who was later killed in battle.




The Fraction Of an Inch That Sometimes Means Life Instead Of Death in War.

A Bible carried in a breast pocket saved the life of a German soldier. The bullet destined for his heart is imbedded in its leaves.




A clip of British cartridges transfixed by a German bullet in a soldier's bandolier.
