


THE HOUSE OF A THOUSAND EXUBERANCES



Edward W. Browning's new home, on the top floor of the skyscraper apartment at 33 Manhattan Square North, is as unique as he had hoped when he planned it. On the roof is a lake, twenty by forty feet, about which, on fine days, Mrs. Browning rows a boat and plucks flowers from the beds that surround it. There are thirty-three flower beds on the roof, which is called "Sunshiné Gardens."



Resolved to have a home like no other, Mr. Browning made his dining room wholly different. Huge bronze frogs and turtles perch on the rim of an illuminated fountain. Crossed spears and battle axes support silk banners, on each of which is a different coat of arms. The other rooms, most of which are thirty-five feet square, are in keeping with this. Mr. Browning is a son of the founder of Browning, King & Co.
