To the right—A tunnel underneath an Italian mountain is being used by these Italian infantrymen to bring up their forces in a surprise counter attack against the Austro-German forces on the other side. To the left—The three oldest Belgian refugees in Paris. The youngest woman of the trio (the one smoking her pipe) is ninety-nine years old. The oldest, age 102, is the one in the centre, holding her cane and rosary.

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French machine gunners established in a built-up shell crater. The entrance tunnel in the left foreground connects with their advance trench. Mud-soaked sandbags have been used to build up the parapet. This emplacement is similar to those used everywhere on the Western front for anti-aircraft guns.
