Tadasaburo Yamamoto is a "famous ship narikin," as the Japanese call a sudden multi-millionaire who has made a fortune through the war. He is the head of the Shosho Yoko, one of the large shipping companies of Japan. He is seen standing on the left of the picture, taken on the day of his return from North Korea, where he had been hunting man-eating tigers on a heroic scale.
