Lieutenant Scott McCormick, N. Y. Killed in France. Was a graduate of Plattsburg.



Ensign C. S. Read, New York, killed in seaplane accident while chasing U-boats off French coast.



Lieutenant Jefferson Feigl, son of Colonel Feigl, of New York. Killed in action in France.



Lieutenant John David, of Dillon, S. C. Killed in action in France.



Corporal John J. Haspel, Elmhurst, L. I. Killed in action.



Lieutenant Jack Wright, New York. Killed in France.



Sergeant Charles H. Peck, jr., New York. Was attached to Roosevelt Hospital Unit in France.



Lieutenant Colonel Raynal C. Bolling, of Greenwich, Conn., was attached to General Pershing's staff. Was killed while flying over the Estrees road in the Amiens sector.



Lieutenant Harold A. Andre, New York. Killed in airplane accident at Camp Hicks, Tex.



Captain James Ely Miller, aviator, killed battling with several German planes over the forest of Corbeny.




Lieutenant Jack Seferen Ennis, jr., New York. Killed in airplane accident at Camp Hicks, Texas.



Seaman John T. Langley, jr., Long Island City. Drowned from submarine chaser.



Seaman Sidney Horwig, New York. Killed when boat on which he was member of the gun crew was torpedoed in foreign waters.



Private George B. Burling, jr., Richmond Hill. Died in France.



Private Arthur V. Hegney, N. Y. First student of College of the City of New York killed in France.



Private George A. Adkins, N. Y. Killed in action.



Chief Gunner's Mate Bernard Coleman, New York. Drowned in foreign waters.
