


Private Harry Gibson, 11th Railway Engineers, Brooklyn. Died in France.

Lieutenant William S. Ely, Rochester, N. Y. Killed in airplane accident at Oxford, England.



Lieutenant Thomas Kirk, U.S.N.R.F., Brooklyn. Drowned in collision.



Captain Arthur F. Locke, 102d Infantry, Hartford, Conn. Killed in action.



Ensign Leslie M. MacNaughton. Killed in seaplane accident, Hampton Roads, Va.



Cadet Frank E. Starrett, Athol, Mass. Killed in airplane accident in France.



Lieutenant George S. Shepard, 18th Infantry, North Easton, Mass. Killed in action.



Lieutenant William K. B. Emerson, U. S. Artillery, Rye, N. Y. Killed in action.



Walter and Allen Moore, of Fitzdale, Vt., killed in action on the same day. Members of the machine gun company of the 103d Infantry.



Lieutenant John Tillman Melvin, U. S. N. R. F. Killed on the torpedoed Alcedo.



Cadet Rogers C. Perkins, Manchester, Vt. Killed in seaplane accident at Key West, Fla.



Private Henry L. Danforth, 103d Infantry, Danville, Vt. Killed in action.



Sergeant Arvid Cederholm, 102d Infantry, Middletown, Conn. Killed in action.



Captain William E. Harwood, of the M. O. R. C., Joliet, Ill. Died in France.



Lieutenant Stephen E. FitzGerald, 16th U. S. Infantry, Roxbury, Mass. Killed in action.
