

Seaman Loomis Trudeau, U. S. S. Lake Moor, Schenectady, N. Y. Killed when boat was torpedoed.



Seaman Bertie Zanetti, U. S. S. President Lincoln, Clifton, N. J. Killed when transport was torpedoed.

Lieut. Howard Smith, U. S. A. C. Newcastle, Ind. Killed in airplane accident in England.
