The German naval officers, shown here "at heel," have doubtless just finished explaining to His Majesty how the regrettable incident was allowed to occur. The Flemish boy in sabots, at the right, does not seem to know that it is very poor form to run along beside an emperor, staring at him, and that he is in imminent danger of being deported to Germany as a *franc tireur*.
