






Another democrat in power. Premier Kei Hara, of Japan, once a journalist.




The "Die Hards." Middlesex Regiment, seem willing to leave at the news of peace. Probably they are fully satisfied with what they did to the Germans.

Not running to-day. Serious Allied washout on the main line—Berlin to Bagdad.




