
On the fourth anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania the enemy decks of the German UC-97—officially credited with the destruction of nine Allied vessels—witnessed a ceremony commemorating the tragic event, when the American crew now manning the sub threw into the sea a memorial wreath. The UC-97 entered New York harbor in the wake of an American merchant vessel which was entirely unconcerned by the near presence of its erstwhile deadly foe.

Right—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels and the accompanying officers stand at salute during the playing of "The Star-Spangled Banner" at Dover, England.


