


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


**T**HIS house of Mr. Frank Young's, which reminds one of the quaint English homes of the sixteenth century, cost \$22,000 to build in 1914. It is built on the side of a hill overlooking a beautiful valley, and is of many colored brick, with red predominating, running into dark blues, browns and salmon colors. The half-timbering was put up in an original manner, being rough hewn on the job. The first and second floor plans presented below give a comprehensive idea of the clever and roomy interior arrangement. Perhaps the most novel feature of its planning is the interesting vestibule and the conservation of space secured by the arrangement of the front stairs. The attic contains a maid's room, playroom and billiard room.

The above view is of the rear of the house, showing the six windows of the dining room and the flagstone porch that opens from it. To the left—another rear view showing the kitchen wing, the heavy slated roof and the massive brick chimney that is an outstanding feature. To the right—the front of the house as seen from the sloping street, showing the interesting half timber and brick treatment and the unusual entrance extension. Below to the left is shown the first floor plan and to the right the second floor plan.

Left—A severe though artistic interior of the living room looking toward the fireplace, with the doorway to the hall at the right and the French windows leading out to the porch at the left.



Right—The charming dining room with its exposed ceiling beams and white woodwork. On one side of the dresser is the enclosed china closet. On the other the door leading to the pantry. The double French doors at the right open on the hall.
