COMMUNITY SERVICE has been reorganized since the war. Its scope has been broadened to meet peace-time needs, which to day are proving as vital to the nation as the needs of war. It offers a wonderful opportunity for constructive and lucrative work to the young woman of today. At present, Community Service is being organized in over two thousand towns. The demand for trained workers is nation-wide and is increasing rapidly. At present the Scudder School could place over three times the number of students that they have enrolled for the course.

### A New Course to Meet a New Need

ALL summer the Scudder School has been in consultation with prominent Community Service workers. With the assistance of such experts as Hastings H. Hart, Dept. of Child Helping, Russell Sage Foundation; Eugene C. Gibney, Asst. Director of Recreation Community Centers, N. Y. Board of Education, and Eva Whiting White, Director of Training of Women and Girls for W. C. C. S., N. Y. C., the Scudder School has evolved a course in Community Service that will prepare you for useful volunteer service and for self-support. The Scudder Community Service will prepare you for *any kind of secretarial work*, but you will have the added value that always attaches itself to a specialist. The Journal of Education says that the course "is the most complete one offered anywhere."
