








The Shamrock IV, challenger for America's Cup. Its owner, Sir Thomas Lipton, who will try next summer for the fourth time to lift the cup, arrived in Halifax last Monday en route to New York to inspect his craft, which has been safely stored away since 1914 in an iron shack in South Brooklyn. Shamrock IV differs greatly from the American defenders, Vanitie and Resolute, being virtually a wooden boat and is the first to be built in England under American measurement rules. Her 160-foot hollow wooden mast is the largest ever made. *Press Illustrating.*

Bust of Abraham Lincoln recently unveiled in the Parish Church of Hingham, Norfolk, England, by Ambassador John W. Davis.
