



From the U. S. destroyer Meredith Secretary of the Navy Daniels reviews the fifty-seven mine sweepers from the North Sea's "Suicide Fleet," anchored in the Hudson. On board these ships, which arrived in port last Sunday, were 3,600 officers and men, the last of America's forces to return home. Since the armistice this doughty little fleet and the heroic lads who manned it have swept foreign waters of more than 50,000 mines (two years' work in nine months!), a record that eclipses that of the British sweepers. 
