

ASKED HANNA TO CONTRIBUTE.

Republican Campaign Managers Want Monetary Aid from the Ohio Senator.

APPEAL IS VERY PATHETIC.

Loss of Congress the Club Used to Coerce McKinley's Manager.

Mark Hanna has been asked by Mr. Platt for a contribution from the National Committee's fund for use in the Greater New York campaign.

A letter was written to the chairman of the Republican National Committee last week explaining the local situation and requesting a liberal contribution to aid General Tracy's candidacy. It is not usual for National Committees to contribute to a local campaign, but the Republican managers said that the present campaign was exceptional in this respect.

They added that they had induced President McKinley's Administration and the St. Louis platform and were conducting their fight on national issues. A Republican victory, they represented, would mean a vindication of the national Administration and would have a powerful effect upon the party throughout the country and particularly upon the Congressional elections in 1898.

On the other hand it was stated that a Democratic victory would be damaging to the entire party and might cause the loss of Congress to the Republicans. In view of these circumstances the National Committee, the Republican managers as well, could well afford to contribute a good-sized amount to bring about a Republican victory. They believe Mark Hanna will appreciate that they are not in the business of inducing national administrations for nothing, and that he will "make good."

Mr. Platt and the Republican machine leaders are taxing their ingenuity to force national issues to the front. The whole effort of the Republican machine is being directed toward bringing about a situation similar to last year's Presidential campaign, with a view of putting the Republicans in a position where they can call upon the "sound money" sources which contributed to the national fund last year.

Orders have been issued to all the district leaders to magnify Henry George's strength and make him appear to be the representative of the silver forces in Chicago platform supporter. They have been instructed to say that the fight is between Tracy and George. The Republican spellbinders have also been carefully schooled on these lines. The idea is to make George's candidacy appear threatening. In the hope of being able to rally the so-called "sound-money" forces around General Tracy.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the Republican platform adopted by the city convention said that the fight was between the Republican candidate and the nominee of the Tammany convention.

Both Senator Foraker and General Tracy, at the Cooper Union meeting, said the issue was Tracy and sound money or George and free silver.

FIXING ALASKA NAMES

United States Board Decides Upon the Spelling of Many Geographical Points in the Gold Country.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10.—The United States Board of Geographic Names, which meets here at stated intervals, has just rendered decisions determining the spelling of 143 geographic names. These included a number in Alaska, significant at this time in view of the Klondike excitement. Many variations of nomenclature for the same place are encountered and the Board's action settles the uniform usage. Following is a summary of action taken relating to places conspicuously mentioned in the gold stories. As to Klondike, the decision is to spell it as given. One of the lakes of the Upper Yukon was named Lebarge by the Western Union Telegraph expedition in 1888, after Mike Lebarge, a member of the exploring party, who now lives somewhere near Ottawa, Canada. Late publications have fallen into the error of spelling this Lebarge, but the Board adheres to the original form of Lebarge.

When Schwatka descended the Yukon in 1888 he named one of the lakes on its banks Lindeman, after Dr. Moritz Lindeman, now vice-president of the Rescuers Geographical Society. This sometimes appears erroneously as Linderman. The Board adopts Lindeman.

One of the principal tributaries of the Upper Yukon is the Lewes River, named by Mr. Robert Campbell of the Hudson Bay Company about 1848. This is often misspelled Lewis.

The inlet, river and village at the head of Lynn Canal, which now appears in the newspapers as daily from the former of the two, the starting point for the overland route, is an Indian word which has appeared in many forms. In 1858, in 1860, wrote it Tyra; Krause, in 1882, wrote it Dejah; Schwatka, in 1883, Dayay; Dall, in 1885, Talya. The Board adopts the form Talya.

For the lake and river variously called Hootahgou or Hootahgou, or Teslin-Hian, or Teslin-Too, or Teslin, the Board adopts Teslin. The termination Hian and Too are said to mean river in different Indian dialects.

An Indian village on the middle Yukon is called Nuklukyet. This has been written in several forms, including the erroneous one Tuklukyet.

FOR A KLONDYKE RAILROAD.

A Party of Seventy Will Sail to Locate the Line from Chilkoot Inlet.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 10.—A party of twelve engineers and surveyors left last evening on the Oregon Express for Seattle, where they will be reinforced by eight assistants, besides fifty others, who will sail for Chilkoot Inlet in a steamer especially chartered for the purpose. At Seattle 200 horses, 150 cattle, feed for six months and 200 tons of general stores will be purchased for the party during the long drive from Seattle to the head of Chilkoot Inlet, to Fort Selkirk, the head of steam navigation of the Yukon, a distance of 300 miles, over a trail little frequented during the winter. The expedition is to determine whether a railway can be built over this 300-mile trail. The engineers will also try to locate a new pass, believed to exist north of the Chilkoot.

The organizers of the expedition are from Boston, San Francisco and Puget Sound and have formed a company with a capital of \$200,000 to meet necessary expenses. The party expects to arrive in January at Fort Selkirk, where permanent headquarters for railway construction will be located. All the members of the party have been engaged for two years.

CYCLIST RACES TO SAVE A LIFE

Woman Hurt on the Run of the Dean Club.

WOUNDED IN A COLLISION.

His Uniform Splashed with Blood, Captain Schultz Sped for an Ambulance.

The run of the Dean Cycle Club of Brooklyn to Rosedale, L. I., came to a sad and sudden end by the serious injury of Mrs. Susan A. Corbin. The disaster happened yesterday on the Merrick road. Thirty-five members started on the run. Among the participants were Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Corbin, of No. 38, Park place. Mr. Corbin is employed by the Waterbury Watch Company as a travelling salesman.

On the return trip the party arrived at Springfield between 3 and 4 o'clock. Mrs. Corbin and a young woman were riding together. Mr. Corbin rode in the rear with the captain of the club, M. Schultz, of No. 87 Ashland place.

At Farmer's avenue Mrs. Corbin suddenly turned and rode obliquely across the road, directly in front of a wheelman riding rapidly in the opposite direction. None save Mrs. Corbin could explain the reason for this sudden turn, and she is not able to tell. Evidently she lost control of her wheel, or else did not see the approaching rider. The bicycle of the man struck the bicycle of Mrs. Corbin with great force.

Both riders fell. The woman was thrown a distance of twelve feet. Walter Phelein, of No. 60 Huron street, Brooklyn, was riding so closely behind that he could not turn in time to avoid disaster, and he a his wheel fell upon her. Neither Phelein nor the other man was hurt severely, but Mrs. Corbin lay unconscious in the road.

The wheelman who struck Mrs. Corbin protested that no blame attached to him. Mrs. Corbin and others of the Dean Club exonerated him from any culpability and supposing that the lady had fainted and was not severely hurt, he rode on.

Mr. Corbin and Captain Schultz gave their attention to the unconscious woman, and one of the party rode rapidly to Springfield and returned with Dr. Smith, whose superficial examination showed that Mrs. Corbin's skull had been fractured in two places. Fatal result of the wound is probable.

A farmer in the neighborhood offered the use of his carriage for an ambulance. Mrs. Corbin, bleeding from her nose and ears, was lifted into the carriage by her husband and Captain Schultz.

His bicycle suit covered with blood that had poured upon him while he was lifting the wounded woman, Captain Schultz rode ahead at his greatest speed to call an ambulance to the Liberty Street Police Station, Brooklyn, by the time the carriage containing Mrs. Corbin should arrive. On the Glenmore cycle path this bloody accident met Sergeant Hanner and to him explained the reason for his haste and the cause of his gory appearance. The sergeant sent a call to St. Mary's Hospital for an ambulance.

Meantime the farmer's carriage led a gloomy procession. Partially conscious, Mrs. Corbin was racked by every vibration. Her husband, in poignant distress, rode with her. Behind trailed the members of the cycle club, silent from gravest apprehension. The gruesome cortege reached the station before the ambulance, and Mrs. Corbin was carried into the building in such condition that death seemed likely to occur at any minute.

The ambulance came, and the diagnosis of the surgeon who accompanied it was not reassuring to Mr. Corbin and the other members of the club. Mrs. Corbin was taken to the hospital. The report last evening was that her recovery is not expected.

none large enough to pass through without some excavation. With the aid of torches, however, the men claim to have discovered capacious openings in these passages further on. They are still at work and will make a thorough exploration in the expectation of finding still larger chambers. There is a brisk current of air at the bottom of the shaft, showing that the passages probably extend for some distance. The men with

their torches, have found that the passages have stalactite ceilings. The cave is in a limestone formation, which is favorable to the existence of natural wonders of that kind.
