


WEST HOBOKEN'S MAYOR DEFEATED IN A THREE-ROUND FIGHT.



THE affecting scene in West Hoboken, which all but broke the proud heart of Mayor John Lane, was continued last night when the council meeting was convened in gloomy formality with His Honor's presence. Not only is Mayor Lane kept to his apartments by contusions and mortification, but it may be his duty to take official cognizance of himself as a law breaker and prize fighter.

JOURNAL FORECAST

ALMOST PROPHETIC.

Its Estimate of the Vote of the Three Leading Candidates Beats All Records for Accuracy. Hugh J. Grant's a Good Second.

Journal's Prophetic Forecast.

ON October 31, two days before the election, the Journal stated, after a thorough and carefully conducted canvass, that the actual voting would give Van Wyck, Low and Tracy these approximate totals:

Van Wyck.....206,548
Low.....137,594
Tracy.....101,046

The official returns show that these three leading candidates did receive this number of votes:

Never before in the history of such campaign forecasts has anything like the accuracy of this prediction been attempted or approached. It stands out as a signal example of what letter-day advanced newspaper methods may accomplish.

So many unforeseen and constantly recurring changes in the complicated situation made it seem a matter of utter impossibility to estimate even the trend of the greater city's vote. So vast was the territory embodied by the enlarged municipalities, so enormous the total vote and so strangely split up into irreconcilable factions that such a thing as an accurate forecast seemed an utter impossibility.

There was but one way and heretofore through the task seemed, the Journal chose. It was to go to the people themselves, in all parts of the Greater New York, and learn their preferences. To do this meant the employ and direction of a small army of canvassers, especially chosen for the task, and the establishment of a separate bureau of compilation under the direction of expert accountants.

The work was begun on September 28, and continued for sixteen days. At the time with the election, the Journal took the verdict of more than one half the entire registered vote of the city. It polled 277,571 out of a total estimated vote of 550,000. The election itself showed that the total vote polled was more than 400,000 short of this estimate. This, therefore, in a measure for the Journal's slight difference between the Journal's forecast and the election result.

At the conclusion of its great poll on October 14, the Journal estimated that Van Wyck's vote would be 170,000; Low's, 118,288, and Tracy's, 87,068. Henry George was alive then, and the enthusiasm which he awakened among his friends and followers

GOVERNOR'S CHAIR TAKES LOW'S EVE.

Citizens' Union Leaders Plan to Send Him There Next Year.

Encouraged by the fact that Seth Low's vote for Mayor exceeded that of the Republican machine candidate, the Citizens' Union leaders and the anti-Platt Republicans, who supported Mr. Low, have already formulated plans to carry the fight against Platt into the State.

Mr. Low's personal friends in the movement were talking yesterday of nominating him for Governor next year in opposition to the regular Republican candidate, who if Platt succeeds in controlling his own convention, will be Lieutenant-Governor Timothy L. Woodruff. Not only is it a full State ticket to be put in the field, but the anti-Platt movement to elect the successor to United States Senator Edward Murphy, Jr.

The candidate whom the promoters of the movement now have in mind for the place is Joseph H. Choate, who received seven votes against Thomas C. Platt in the Republican caucus last year. The anti-machine Republicans and Mr. Low's supporters make no attempt to cover up their determination to conduct an orderly fight against Platt in every year. Seth Low, in his comment on the result of the election, plainly indicated his sympathy with the movement against the municipal leader when he said:

"The returns show that there was no possibility of a Republican success in this contest on party lines, nor is it possible to imagine a time when in this there will be."

Mass Meeting Called. The Republican organization of the city of New York, of which William Brookfield is the leader, called a public meeting yesterday, to be held at Lyric Hall, November 11, at 8 o'clock, at which the anti-Platt movement will be formally launched. The work of interesting independent Republicans in the interest of the anti-Platt movement was begun and it was announced last night that promises of co-operation had been received from Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Troy and Albany.

The strongest ally will be Jacob Worth, Platt's arch enemy in Kings County, who has publicly declared his intention of carrying the war to the end. The talk of renouncing Mr. Low for Governor, and Mr. Choate for the United States Senate, created quite a stir in political circles. It is understood that Mr. Low looks in the proposition with considerable favor, and does not intend to discourage his friends who are behind the scheme. Mr. Choate agreed to make the fight against Platt last year when there was not even the remotest chance of success, and his friends say he would not be averse to trying again.

Low Still Has Hopes. While his overwhelming defeat for the Mayorship was a bitter disappointment to him, Mr. Low has not abandoned hope of political advancement. He found much consolation in the fact that he received
