

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S PLACE STIRS UP A ROW.


indication Point to the Naming of Capt. Francis C. Landon by Governor Roosevelt, but Party Bosses Object.

Platt and Odell Said to Champion Gen. Edward Hoffman for the Appointment and a Party Split Is Promised.

Landon, of the Seventh Regiment, Is Also Opposed by Spanish-American War Veterans and Irish-Americans.

Governor Roosevelt's announcement from Albany yesterday that he would appoint no one to the Adjutant-Generalship "not thoroughly approved by Avery D. Andrews," coupled with a semi-official statement that Andrews's choice is Captain Francis Griswold Landon, of Company I, Seventh Regiment, created great perturbation among Platt machine Republicans in this town.

Chairman Odell was informed of Roosevelt's plan at a very late hour last night. He declined to express an opinion. He did not know Captain Landon and refused to discuss him. Earlier in the evening the chairman had expressed to friends the hope that General Hoffman would be appointed.

Roosevelt's declaration a year ago that he would name the Democratic chief of the staff to the position of Adjutant-General was announced at the Fifth Avenue Republican State Headquarters by the late Senator Platt.

Chairman Odell would neither deny nor confirm the suggestion that General E. A. McAlpin be rewarded for his services as commander of the machine forces upon a Republican officer who was turned down for a Democracy a year ago.

The Governor's intimates declared positively upon the heels of Andrews's resignation that he was to be appointed to the position of Adjutant-General. The Spanish-American war, which is likely to show Governor Roosevelt with attacks upon the machine, is the moment when the Republican organization has made no recommendation for Adjutant-General.

LIBRARY CLOSURE IS THIS CHORUS GIRL MAID OR WIFE?

Citizens and Officials Reply to the Threat of the Society That Controls the Free Circulating Institution.

On the Other Hand the Criticized Officials Say the Reduced Appropriation Makes Retrenchment Imperative.

Amalgamation With the New Public Library Believed to Be the Best Ultimate Solution of the Problem.

That the ten branches of the Free Circulating Library of New York ought not to be closed on Sunday was insisted upon yesterday by all citizens and officials who were seen in regard to the subject.

It costs from 7 to 8 cents for every volume of circulation," said President J. Frederic Kernochan, of the library, yesterday afternoon. "And that figure represents the closest possible economy, without our going ahead with new buildings and extensions that we had hoped for."

Secretary Francis C. Huntington was seen at his office, No. 48 Wall street, and said: "The appropriation for the library was made on a sliding scale, the basis being the volume of circulation as per the report for the year ending June 30."

Organized Twenty Years Ago. "Our society was organized twenty years ago to give New York a full circulating library, which otherwise this great city would not have had."

When Mr. Coler was told of the allegation of the library officials, that the scale should be applied to the ten branches separately, he said there might perhaps be something in it, and at least the point would be worthy of consideration for next year.
