New York Must Be Content with White and Archie Baxter.

TOO MUCH OSBORNE.

McKinley's Cousin Draws Two Salaries and Will Not Give Major Dick a Chance.

QUAY'S MAN GOES TO AUSTRIA.

Charlemagne Tower Appointed Minister at Vienna—Curtis, of New York, Wants to Be Alger's Assistant in the War Department.

Washington, March 29.—Though New York State did not appear in today's nominations, the delegation is satisfied that Andrew J. White and Archie E. Baxter will be named, respectively, for Ambassador to Germany and Third Assistant Postmaster-General to-morrow or at some other early date. The President has reasons of his own for withholding nominations for they have been agreed upon, as is apparent in the case of H. Clay Evans, who was appointed Pension Commissioner today. Evans's appointment having been decided upon two weeks ago. As soon as Commissioner Evans reaches Washington he will have a conference with Major Poole, of New York, which will decide whether that gentleman or some other is to be First Deputy Commissioner.

The New York delegation is satisfied that Colonel Fred Grant is no longer to be considered for the diplomatic services, for there is no place in which to put him. A new candidate for Minister to Spain, in the person of William Martin, of Dunkirk, is announced this afternoon. He was accompanied by Lester Stearns, of the same city, who was a McKinley delegate to St. Louis. Both are personal friends of McKinley, which leads Martin to assume that he will be given a place abroad. The delegation is favorable to Martin for something.

Three other prominent politicians of the Empire State who are now in Washington, though not for patronage, are B. S. Dean, John G. Wilkes and William Dodge, of Jamestown. There is trouble over the contemplated removal of their Post Office. An injunction has been obtained preventing the removal, and these gentlemen have come on to try and persuade the Post Office Department to revoke its order. E. C. Ward, of Buffalo, is pressing his candidacy for Consul to Bordeaux, but he had not yet succeeded in getting Senator Platt and the Representatives to visit the White House and urge his appointment.

Cousin Osborne in the Way. President McKinley and Senator Hanna now have troubles of their own. It is a case of two against one. Osborne, who is well known as the secretary of the Republican National Committee. In sending Cousin Osborne abroad it was the President's intention to make room on the National Committee for Major C. W. F. Dick, of Akron, to whom he felt indebted for managing a gubernatorial campaign in Ohio. Dick has been Hanna's assistant for more than a year, and he is wanted just now to run the Junior Ohio Senator's campaign for the Legislature.

Senator Osborne and the former declines to resign his secretaryship until the day he leaves for London, which will be incidentally, for funds, but McKinley and Hanna cannot take care of him until Osborne chooses to let go. At present Cousin Osborne is driving two salaries, is stopping at the best hotel and is taking three large meals a day. Major Dick has lightened his belt and is preparing for a nineteen days' fast.

There is a report, which no doubt will interest the place hunters, to the effect that President McKinley may soon issue an order directing that the assistant secretaries of the various departments may have the same privilege enjoyed by the cabinet members of appointing confidential officers for each secretary. The confidential clerks may receive from \$1,200 to \$1,600 each.

Interwoven to Look After Patents. Representative Newton M. Curtis, of New York, is still an active candidate for Assistant Secretary of War, and is gratified at the report that General Cowan, of Nebraska, has declined this appointment. Curtis may yet be named. Senator Pritchard to-day asked for the appointment of H. A. Gardner, of North Carolina, as Minister to Brazil. Secretary Wellington reported that George P. Suedde, of Maryland, be appointed Minister to Denmark; Senator Fairbanks presented the application of William H. Elliott, of Indiana, for Assistant Secretary of the Navy; Senator Foraker, of Ohio, accompanied W. A. Fletcher, a colored leader of Georgia, to the White House, and filed papers with an application for Consul-General to Jamaica. John Russell Young has asked for reappointment to his former office, that of Minister to China.

It is reported that President McKinley has prevailed upon ex-Representative Benjamin Butterworth, of Indiana, to accept the Commissioner's office, which office he held under Harrison. Butterworth has been dodging this appointment for weeks, and expects to be appointed in the near future. General Horace Porter said to-day that he would not leave for France until he had been relieved of the work pertaining to the monument fund.

SHERMAN GETS SMITH IN. The Ohio Man is Director of the Bureau of American Republics After All.

Washington, March 29.—Secretary Sherman remains confined to his home by an attack of influenza, but expects to be at the State Department to-morrow. He is able to attend to pressing business, however, and this morning promptly signed the appointment of Joseph P. Smith, of Ohio, as Director of the Bureau of American Republics. Only three men participated in the competitive examination for this position, and all the names were certified to Secretary Sherman as eligible. Smith stood second in rank.

HELENA A FAST GUNBOAT.

Sister Ship to the Wilmington at Her Trial Trip Earns \$55,000 Premium for Her Builders.

New London, Conn., March 29.—At 6 o'clock this morning the gunboat Helena, sister to the Wilmington, which made a little more than fifteen knots an hour on Saturday, started for her official trial run of four consecutive hours over the Long Island Sound course. The water and weather conditions were excellent for the trial, and the builders, the Newport News Shipbuilding Company, anticipated a showing of fast speed, as the Helena had developed a half knot better time than the Wilmington in a preliminary run.

These expectations were fully realized, as the Helena made a splendid run, averaging 15.8 knots, and earning a premium of \$55,000, as she gets at the rate of \$5,000 for each quarter knot in excess of 13 knots, her contract speed. She covered half the course in seven minutes, or twelve seconds less than the Wilmington did, and on the return added to that good record. She ran as steady as could be desired, scarcely any vibration being noticeable at her highest speed.

The tide calculations will be slightly against the Helena, but 15 1/2 knots will be claimed and undoubtedly allowed her. The gunboat returned from the trial trip with a broom at her military peak.

Torpedo Boat Launching Postponed. Newport, R. I., March 29.—The launching of torpedo boat No. 7, at Bristol, did not take place to-day, owing to an unfavorable tide, and was postponed until 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

HERE'S AN ONION BARON.

James McKinley, of Kansas City, Mo., Has Cornered the Market with 27,000 Barrels.

From out Kansas City way comes word that one James McKinley has cornered himself King Onion, and lined his coffers with 27,000 barrels of that pungent vegetable. The onion baron has cornered the market in the West, South and portions of the East, and is waiting for a raise. Prices have advanced nearly one-half in the past two weeks. The Bermuda crop, which is being raised in great quantities, is the onion trust, but meanwhile meanness is felt in corned beef hash and hamburger steak dishes, where the onion is an absolute necessity.

Last Saturday in the local produce markets red onions jumped from \$3.50 to \$5 a barrel, this figure being asked on board schooners freely from the onion fields of Connecticut. While onions advanced from \$7 to \$9 a barrel and the yellow variety used in cooking doubled. Local dealers say, however, that the effect of McKinley's trust could not be felt this far East; that he could not control the market here, where he is holding on for an advance. The price in the West has gone up from \$1.75 to \$2.50 a barrel, all on account of King McKinley. As one Fulton Market dealer put it, "He sees an awful finish for the onion baron should the Bermuda crop come in his hands."

URNS AIR INTO LIQUID.

Professor Linde, of Munich, Accomplishes This at a Very Low Cost.

Washington, March 29.—(Consul-General De Kay, at Berlin, reports to the State Department the discovery of a new method by which air may be liquefied cheaply, and therefore of practical use in the industries and arts. There are so many uses for liquefied air that scientists hardly know where its usefulness will end if it can be produced at low cost in commercial quantities. This has been accomplished by a new method and apparatus devised by Professor Linde of Munich.

FOREIGN WAR SHIPS IN GRANT PARADE.

Secretary Sherman Sent Invitations to Maritime Nations Yesterday.

THE PRESIDENT TO REVIEW.

Colonel William Mosby Will Command 500 Sons of Confederates.

CHANGE IN LINE OF MARCH.

Governor Lowndes, of Maryland, with His Entire Staff, and the Fifth Regiment, Maryland National Guard, to Attend.

Secretary Sherman sent from Washington yesterday to all American Ministers abroad a cablegram requesting them to officially invite, in the name of President McKinley, all maritime nations to send war ships to participate in the ceremonies attendant upon the Grant Monument dedication on April 27. "It will be gratifying to this Government," the cablegram announces, "if this invitation could be accepted."

President McKinley will review the parade at Claremont. There is a chance that a new line of march will be adopted in accordance with suggestions made to Grand Marshal Dodge yesterday by Captain Henry D. Lockwood, formerly of the Seventh and Twelfth Regiments. Captain Lockwood advanced, as the best route for the public and the paraders, one extending up Fifth avenue to Fifty-seventh street, thence to Broadway, to the west end of Riverside Park, around Claremont, down the east side of Riverside Drive to One Hundred and Tenth street, and thence to the Boulevard, where the various organizations taking part in the parade may conveniently proceed to their headquarters or to the points of their departure from the city.

Chief Bomber, of the Fire Department, will have 150 men and twenty machines in the parade, according to the existing plans. In the case of the Fire Department it will be furnished. Governor Lowndes, of Maryland, will attend the ceremonies with his staff, and the Fifth Regiment of the Maryland National Guard, conceded to be one of the finest military organizations in the South. In view of the fact that the Maryland National Guard, conceded to be one of the finest military organizations in the South, will be present, the number originally promised by A. S. Towson. There will be 500 in line, under command of Colonel William Mosby, who was a firm friend of General Grant's, and served as Consul-General to China during the latter's term as President.

Lieutenant Albert C. Dillingham of the navy, who has been selected by Secretary Long to serve in General Dodge's staff, called at headquarters yesterday to consult with Chief of Staff Blakeman about the naval parade. It is said at the Navy Yard that all the vessels attached to the North Atlantic Squadron, both at this station and assigned to duty all along the Atlantic coast, will take part in the ceremonies. This will bring together the greatest array of modern war vessels ever assembled in this harbor. Besides the ships of the United States navy, the revenue service there will be a number of vessels from foreign navies. The flagship New York will sail on Monday next for the Navy Yard to the winter rendezvous at Hampton Roads, returning with the rest of the fleet for the monument ceremonies.
