FARRAGUT'S VETERANS IN THE TEXAS.

Veterans of This War Greet the Men Who Fought Thirty Years Ago. DECORATE CAPTAIN PHILIP. Commander of the Battle Ship Is Made an Honorary Member of the Association.

On the deck of the battle ship Texas yesterday, Captain Philip met again the men with whom, under Farragut, he had sailed and fought in the days of the War of the Rebellion. At the invitation of the man who has made the name of the Texas historic, the Farragut Association of Naval Veterans, nearly one hundred and fifty strong, made an official visit to the battle ship yesterday.

When they left there glistened on the Captain's lapel, just below the tricolor button that tells of long-ago fights, a new emblem—the badge of the Farragut Naval Veterans. Captain Philip was, in virtue of his record, a Farragut veteran, but yesterday the association more formally annexed him by making him an honorary member of the organization.

Unwilling to attract either attention or a crowd, the association kept its proposed visit to the Texas a secret. The selected meeting place was the Brooklyn end of the Bridge, and a little before 2 o'clock the veterans gathered there. All wore plain clothes, but each was decorated with the badge of the association, an unpretentious, little bronze medal of a wreathed anchor, bearing on its bar the name of the ship upon which the wearer had served.

They Came Unheralded. There had been no band to herald their coming, and cheering had been tolerably frequent throughout the day, so that Captain Philip did not know, until the veterans lined up across the deck, that he was the center of attention.

Eight Negroes Shot Down. Gambler Killed at Bayboro, Ga., in a Battle with Sheriff's Men. Montire, Ga., Aug. 14.—Sheriff Fisher and a posse of thirteen men made a raid on a crowd of negro gamblers at Bayboro, thirteen miles east of Montire, last night. There were seventy-five or one hundred negroes in the house, and as Sheriff Fisher walked in some of the negroes began shooting.
