


J. P. MORGAN TREADS THE DECK OF HIS OLD YACHT, IMMORTALIZED BY WAR.



Points Proudly to the Metal "Furniture" That Has Replaced Easy Chairs on the Gloucester.

J. PIERPONT MORGAN dropped down in his new yacht yesterday to visit his old yacht, now the Gloucester, which has brought so much honor on the Corsair family. He took with him a party of young ladies and a proudly showed them all over the ship.

Commander Walright and his officers entertained the party.

The Gloucester was declared closed to the ordinary run of uninvited visitors who swarmed over the other war ships at the Tompkinsville anchorage. Hundreds of small boats were sent away from the Gloucester's side with disappointed passengers, for the yacht, that destroyed the Spanish torpedo boat destroyers is easily the favorite among the sight-seeing crowd.

Mr. Morgan described to his friends all of the changes war had made in the once luxurious Corsair. He pointed out where steel had replaced polished wood and curtains and hangings had been ruthlessly torn away. Mostly he lingered on the after deck, the charming place under the awnings that used to be given up to cozy chairs and stegier rugs—now a stark place with an unaimable six-pounder as its most prominent piece of furniture.

The crew were glad of the rest. They have had a terrific time telling how they did it since the Gloucester arrived. For the first few hours it was fun explaining to girls in yachting suits that the Gloucester was not a monitor, and that, despite the fact that we kept the American flag flying, she was not a flag ship. Yesterday the crew stood around and enjoyed themselves.

The Gloucester has more to show for her victory in the way of souvenirs than many of the big ships. Many of the tars and jackets aboard her were amateurs and had not traced the professional point of hauler seen for such weaknesses as sailing reliefs.

thing or many things from Cervera's ships. And the stories those Gloucester men have to tell.

There is Gunner Otto Brown's story that goes with his relic. Mr. Brown stands apart scornfully while the others show ex-

ploded six-pounder shells from the Vizcaya, through which American one-pounders had torn; lumps of iron dotted together by the awful heat of the conflagration engendered by the American shells; burned and fused watches, rings, the settings of which had melted and run until the fire-marked gems were nearly covered; life belts with the name of a Spanish ship; Mauser rifles and cartridges and a thousand such things.

He would not even trade with the man who has the officer's sword welded fast by his melted scabbard to a Mauser rifle barrel that was twisted like a corkscrew by the heat.

Yet Otto Brown's relic is only an irregular patch of rag, a mixture of silk and cotton, apparently. "I got it," says Mr. Brown as he waves the rag, "when we captured Cervera. The Spanish Admiral was in his underclothes on shore, and there was a big surf running, and he went overboard when we were getting him into the boat. I grabbed by the only slack piece about the Admiral, and it fetched away in my hand. We got him to the ship all right, but he asked to be excused from rising until somebody loaned him a pair of trousers."

There seems to be the same sort of doubt about the genuineness of Mr. Brown's relic that there is about the alleged remains of Christopher Columbus in the Havana Cathedral. The fantastic story is that somebody accidentally used the priceless souvenir as a wiping rag on the brass work, and drawing the result of discovery, threw it overboard and replaced it at the sacrifice of part of his own wardrobe.

Another of the pet stories on the Gloucester is that in the midst of the sea the order came to man the ash hoist, and that the crews left their smoking guns for the prosaic task of getting overboard the refuse from the fire rooms, and this in the face of the fierce cannonading of the Pluton and Terror.

The Gloucester, while it sent many Spanish ashore to death, saved more from drowning. "Of course we were glad to help the poor devils out of the water," said a quartermaster, "but it was kind of sickening to have the Greasers kiss you when you leaned over the boat rail to lift them aboard. They thought we were going to murder them, sure, and tried to kiss us into a good humor."

TORUSH TROOPS FROM CAMP BLACK

Three New York Regiments Are Ordered to Move Away at Once.

The Quartermaster's Department in this city yesterday received urgent orders from Washington to have the Two Hundred and First, Two Hundred and Second and Two Hundred and Third New York Provisional Regiments moved from Camp Black, at Hempstead, immediately.

The authorities at Washington are alarmed at the spread of typhoid fever, and the report of twenty-seven new cases of probable typhoid yesterday caused the officials to act promptly. Orders had been received last week to receive bids for the removal of the troops at Hempstead, but the new instructions permit of no delay.

The regiments are to be sent to Camp Meade, at Littleton, Pa. They will be moved as soon as transportation can be arranged. The Long Island Railroad Company cannot transport troops from Camp Wilcox if they will probably be in the middle of the week before all the New York regiments at Camp Black are sent away.

The Eighth Ohio leaves Camp Wilcox today, and will be sent to Columbus, Ohio, there to be mustered out. Every effort will be made to get the New York regiments away from the disease-infested camp at Hempstead. Word has been received from Albany that the Governor has ordered Dr. Baileer T. Sumner, secretary of the State Board of Health, to investigate the condition of Camp Black for the purpose of discovering if the water supply there had been contaminated. The investigation will begin to-day.

The post surgeons at Camp Black deny publicly the existence of disease, but the authorities at Washington have countermanded the orders for volunteers doing garrison duty to report at Camp Black, and have ordered a corps of nurses to be sent to Camp Black to nurse the sick there. There are 120 men in the hospital all told, of whom thirty are sick with typhoid, and were reported yesterday, but many of the men are so low that hope all of the cases come from the Two Hundred and First Regiment.

Colonel Byrne, chief surgeon of the Department of the East, arrived at Camp Black yesterday morning and spent the entire day inspecting the camp. The fault, he said, lay with the wells in the surrounding country, and he considered them a source of danger.

DID KAISER BUY ISLANDS OF SPAIN?

Rumor That He Has Secured Palawan and Sulu, of the Philippines.

Special Cable Dispatch to the Journal. (Copyright, 1898, by W. R. Hearst.) Hong Kong, Sept. 5.—A rumor, emanating from Spanish sources, prevails here to the effect that Germany has purchased Palawan and Sulu, islands of the Philippine group, from Spain. It is said German ships will sail to take possession of the islands as soon as the American gunboat Concord leaves here for Manila.

The Philippine Junta, by direction of Aguinaldo's Cabinet, has petitioned Washington to have Consul-General Wildman made a member of the Peace Commission.

Manila, Sept. 5.—There have been several strikes here, the demand being for excessive wages. Because the American authorities, in the early exigencies of the situation here, agreed to the extravagant demands of laborers, it has been difficult to return to an equitable basis. One of these strikes caused the suspension of traffic on the tramways of Manila for three days.

Copies of the new tariff have been circulated here, but it has not yet been enforced, pending the receipt of instructions from Washington. It is estimated that under the American tariff there will be an average reduction of one-third as compared with that of Spain.

An insurgent newspaper, printed in the Spanish language, appeared here to-day.

Hopeless Task for Spain. (A 29 Madrid, Sept. 5.—General Jaundez, an Interior Governor of the Philippine Islands, replying to the Government's request for information as to the true situation of affairs in the Archipelago, reports that to assure the re-establishment of Spanish sovereignty over the Islands would require a permanent army of 60,000 men, a fleet and endless quantities of material.

"During this voyage of 7,000 knots the Monterey was towed 3,725 knots by the Brutus and two stops were made, one at Honolulu and the other at the Island of Guam, in the Marian group. At each of these places the Monterey was coaled. It steamed from shore and in Guam from the Brutus. The distance towed and that steamed without towing are as follows: June 8 to June 23, towed 712 knots; July 5 to July 22, towed 2,541 knots; July 25 to July 28, towed 472 knots; steamed without towing, 3,875 knots; total, 7,000 knots.

The eighteenth meridian was crossed between the 8th and 31st of July, so that the 8th and 10th were but one, and the total number of towing hours was 551 and 670 knots the average into the Monterey was hauled across the Pacific by the Brutus."
