A Man, Too, Who Left a Hat and Livery and Went Away Wearing Diamonds.

ALL THIS AT MOUNT VERNON

Horse Had Been Driven Far, Cab Was Broken and the Occupants Disappeared in the Night

Mystery surrounds a rubber-tired cab, a bottled horse and part of a coachman's livery, which Policeman Edward Jones found in South Fifth avenue, Mount Vernon, at 3 o'clock yesterday morning.

Policeman Jones found the cab and the horse covered with lather standing in front of Mrs. Eugene Barguet's house, No. 114 South Fifth avenue.

The cab is richly upholstered. The glass in both doors and the rear springs are broken, while the cushions and the wheels are out of gear.

Under the cushions were three copies of rules and regulations for New York hackmen.

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At No. 49 West Fifty-third street nothing could be learned from the address which came to be on the envelope.

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CROWDED ELEVATOR FALLS. MAN'S ARM NEARLY TORN OFF. Caught by a Cable, It Is Carried Round a Drum and Crushed.

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THE overcrowding of an elevator in the big Metz Building, Nos. 128 to 134 Mott street, yesterday afternoon caused the supporting rope to give way and the elevator fell to the cellar.

The elevator, according to those in charge of it, is built to carry about fifteen persons, but from twenty-five to thirty, nearly all of whom were more or less bumped and bruised, were on it when it fell.

The elevator, which is one of an old-fashioned type, used for both freight and passenger service, rebounded ten feet when it reached the floor, and fell back again.

Victor Berlin, a tailor who works for Rosenthal & Co., clothing contractors on the fourth floor, had a narrow escape in leaving the elevator from having his arm torn off.

The accident happened at about 12:30 p. m., and was the second in three months. The elevator was packed, according to the employees, with tin sides, which are of wire trellis work, bulged out.

Berlin was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital. He was borne out by the rush of the others before he could get to the rope. The drum was still slowly revolving and his arm was being drawn between it and the cable, which in a second, seized and held until the cable was out.

He escaped with a crushed arm and two broken fingers. The accident happened at about 12:30 p. m., and was the second in three months.

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
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
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CROSS SHOWS WHERE CABLE BROKE ON THE DRUM.
