

FROM THE NINETEEN TO THE SEVENTEEN. "A SHAME!" -- JUDGE LEVENTRITT. HE WROTE THE OPINION IN THE CASE REFERRED TO IN THE BAR ASSOCIATION ATTACK. CROKER AND BELMONT MUCH INCENSED. THEY DECLARE THAT MESSRS. ROOT AND CHOATE ARE USING THEIR ORGANIZATION FOR FURTHERING PARTIZAN PURPOSES.

Leventritt was read, it was kept from the report. "It seems to me it is about time that a Bar Association is organized that want have to consult with Platt and Lauterbach before it takes action. Root and his clique have destroyed the usefulness of the association by turning it to partisan purposes. Look at the list of committees which are nearly all made up of Republicans and see what chance any loyal Democrat would have with them. I am not commenting on the action of the association for political purposes, but just to show up the hypocrisy."

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Mr. Belmont's Comment. "In commenting upon the attack on Mr. Leventritt, Perry Belmont said: "The Bar Association has become in late years so hopelessly partisan that its action last night is only another proof of the necessity of a new association of the Bar, which I trust will speedily be organized--one which will not permit itself to be led into the arena of politics."

Mr. Croker's Comment. "Mr. Croker's manner and words were unusually emphatic, showing how deep was his interest. He said: "It is just what might be expected from the Bar Association, as constituted at present. It is nothing more or less than a certain machine aimed for the Republican party, run by Elihu Root, a Republican attorney for corporations and trusts."

LABOR TO QUESTION THE CANDIDATES. In Lauterbach's Office. They selected the candidates themselves at that meeting, and afterward rushed them down to the Bar Association."

THE Republican canvass of legislative districts is about no allying prospects that Senator Platt will be able to name the successor to United States Senator Edward Murphy, Jr., though the Platt ferryman of 1893 was arranged for the sole purpose of making it practically impossible for the Democrats to get a majority in either branch of the Legislature. The figures received by the Republican campaign managers show that they can, up to date, count on barely 91 of the 200 members of the next Legislature, or ten less than a majority on joint ballot. At present they control 116 members. Well informed Republicans concede to the Democrats 78 votes in both houses, and class 31 as doubtful. They say Senator Platt can control 23 of the 50 Senate districts, and 85 of the 150 Assembly districts. This is 3 less than a majority in the Senate and 8 less than a majority in the lower house.

The candidate will leave Oyster Bay at 8 o'clock. Roosevelt did not come to church yesterday and received no visitors.
