

BOY'S FAST SPREE IS KILLING HIM. He Is Only Fifteen and Is Unconscious in a Hospital.

IN A COMA FOR 24 HOURS. Saloon Keeper Who Sold Him the Liquor May Face a Serious Charge.

HIS COMPANION IS ALL RIGHT. The Two Lads Started with \$2 Apiece, and It Did Not Take Them Long to Become Intoxicated and Arrested.

Because fifteen-year-old James Levine, son of Michael Levine, of No. 12 Coney Island avenue, was in a critical condition yesterday morning in the Kings County Hospital, Flatbush, from alcoholism, he could not be in court for trial.

With Thomas Carlin, son of William Carlin, of No. 594 Adams place, who is also but fifteen years old, Levine started out on Friday on a spree. They had \$2 each and they treated each other and their friends until about 2 o'clock, when they were arrested for intoxication. Acting Detective Dougherty saw the boys could not navigate. He called a patrol wagon, placed the lads in it and sent them to the Great street police station. On the way Levine became unconscious.

The driver of the wagon worked over him, but to no avail, and when he reached the station house his condition was so serious as to necessitate his removal to the hospital. He failed to regain consciousness for eight hours, and then it was only for a few moments when he again lapsed into what appeared to be a death sleep. When the case was called before Magistrate Steers in the Flatbush Police Court, Acting Detective Dougherty announced the condition of his prisoner and asked that the case be adjourned until he was able to see if the lad would recover. This was done. Magistrate Steers, on the pleading of Carlin's mother, sent the detective that he and Levine bought the liquor at the hotel of John Cummings, in Coney Island avenue. A complaint was filed by Dougherty and it was made against the hotel keeper, who, in the event of the Levine boy's death, will have to face a very serious charge.

At the Kings County Hospital yesterday afternoon it was said there was no change in the boy's condition.

BOY GORED BY AN ENRAGED COW. Little George Smith Found Unconscious in a Field.

George Smith, the eleven-year-old son of a Washingtonville, N. J., farmer, went yesterday morning to take a cow to a field some distance from the barn at 8 o'clock, and nothing further was seen of him till after 11 o'clock, when Mrs. George Stewart, who is a neighbor of the Smiths, found the lad lying in the yard surrounding her house with two big gashes in his body—one in the head and the other in the breast. His face was covered with blood and he was unconscious. Mrs. Stewart secured help and carried the injured boy into her house, and Dr. Long, of this city, was called. When the boy regained consciousness he said that just as he was about to tether the cow, the animal became unruly and hooked him twice. He started for home, but was unable to go any further than the spot he was found on. It is feared that besides the wounds he has sustained internal injuries.

TWO FIRES IN THE SAME BUILDING. Twice Within an Hour the Tenants Fled in Terror to the Street.

Two fires in the same house gave the inmates successive frights early yesterday morning. Both fires were in the cellar of the five-story brick tenement at No. 28 Broome street. The first fire was about midnight, caused by a defective boiler in the kitchen. One of the inmates of the house, smelling the smoke, hurried out of their rooms. The entire place was in a state of excitement for the next half hour. Men, women and children hastened to the street without dressing themselves. The women and children were particularly distressed, as hardly one was hurt in the wild rush for the street. The fire was extinguished before it damaged the building.

Silver-Gray Fox Killed. The first gray fox shot in this section in five years was killed yesterday afternoon by Frank E. Woodruff, of East Second street. Woodruff, together with a number of others, started the game animal a short distance beyond the city limits, along the Port Reading Railroad tracks. It was then about noon. The fox dashed off to escape the pack of hounds accompanying the hunters, but the dogs took the trail and followed successfully. The chase led in the direction of Metuchen. The animal, after running six miles, was shot in the vicinity of Metuchen by Woodruff. The fox was a large one with beautiful silver-gray fur.

Civil Service Opinion. Corporation counsel Whelan called yesterday regarding the opinion of Attorney General Hancock in relation to the local civil service rules. "This is his opinion on the matter," said Whelan, "and it is only a matter of opinion until the courts decide. They will probably do so without any special aid to get the question before them, as there is a number of suits coming up, among which the question will probably be decided." Corporation Counsel Whelan said that he would be guided entirely by the Corporation Counsel's opinion in anything he did in regard to paying salaries.

A Roguish Man's Vengeance. Sabbath night, a man in a dark coat, thirty-eight years of age, of No. 434 East One Hundred and Twelfth street, when driving through Thirty-eighth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, yesterday morning, saw a number of men attacking a countryman of his. Seizing a bike, he jumped from his wagon and began striking right and left. He struck among others James Altman, thirty-eight years of age, of No. 682 West Forty-second street. Altman received a possible fracture of the skull and was taken to a hospital. Spots was arrested and held in \$1,000 bail to await the result of Altman's injuries.
