ALICE, THE SAILOR, HOW IT FEELS TO LOSE A MEMORY.

Commissioners of Immigration Mysterious "John Warner" Describes It as a Sensation of Blankness.

Alice McKinley, the immigrant on the Paris who has been a sailor in the clothes of a boy—a Rosalind in a forest of masts—appeared in the Board Room of the Barge Office yesterday to be questioned. She wore a long black cloak, a white skirt, all crumpled, a straight-brimmed hat felt that with a wide black and white ribbon and gray feathers of a bird unknown to naturalists. She was called to the table and sworn. Then she said: "I have written a letter to you. Read it. It tells the truth." The Commissioner at the head of the table read the letter aloud. It said that her real name was Annie McMonroe; that she was born in England, that her mother was in a lunatic asylum, that she had never been in the United States. It destroyed one by one all the chances that the girl had of coming into this country. "Do you intend to be a sailor again?" she was asked. "Perhaps," she replied. "I like the work. It is not too hard for me. Of course I would prefer to be a secret here. I am not going to live in that horrible England. My father? I do not know where he is; he never cared for me. I have to shift for myself. I want to learn things, to do things. Oh, why hadn't I the courage to tell a sorry tale!" Then she was ordered to the detention room of the Barge Office to await transportation back to England.

FIREMEN CRUSHED AT CAMBRIDGE.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 21.—The great pack packing establishment of John P. Squire & Co., at East Cambridge, in which a \$40,000 fire occurred two weeks ago and one man was killed, was again visited by fire this morning. The property loss is estimated at \$100,000. This is covered by a blanket policy of \$1,000,000 on the whole plant. The missing man is John Ward, watchman, who is supposed to have perished in the burning building. When the fire was at its height the front wall which rose to a height of six and a half stories on a narrow street, in which the firemen were at work, fell. Several firemen were buried in the wreck, all of whom were injured. Truckman Feltman was one of this number. He was taken to the Massachusetts General Hospital, where it is said he cannot recover.

KILLED BY A ROUGH RIDER'S HORSE.

Animal Hitched to a Grocer's Wagon Runs Away—Driver and Another Man Dying.

A horse that went through the Santiago campaign with Roosevelt's Rough Riders killed one man and fatally injured another in Paterson, N. J., yesterday. It was bought recently by Samuel Tierney, a Paterson grocer, and yesterday Clarence Mills, a clerk, took it to deliver some goods. He took his grandfather, Joseph Mills, who is seventy-two years old, for a ride. In going down Totowa Hill the horse became unmanageable and ran away, and in Kyle avenue the wagon was upset. Young Mills struck the curbstone head foremost, and both he and his grandfather were unconscious. They were hurried to the General Hospital, but young Mills died chiefly from shock, but on account of his advanced age there is practically no hope of his recovery.

MRS. BRUSH'S CALF WAS A PILFERER.

And Mrs. O'Reilly Said Mrs. Brush Hit Her When She Protested. A jury in the Queens County Court at Long Island City heard testimony in the case of Mrs. Matilda Brush, of Hollis, on the trial for assault in the second degree. The complaint was Mrs. Ellen O'Reilly, who told how she came to find out why her cow would not give milk. The women were neighbors. Mrs. O'Reilly owns a cow, while Mrs. Brush owned a calf. Mrs. O'Reilly tied her cow in a field to pasture. Mrs. Brush's calf was also tied, but broke the cord holding him and went to Mrs. O'Reilly's cow. She declared that she caught the calf milking several times from her cow, and that while complaining to Mrs. Brush about her calf taking the O'Reilly milk there was a dispute. Mrs. Brush, it is alleged, struck Mrs. O'Reilly over the head.
