Leaders Will Fight His Election to Succeed Senator Murphy.

THE FRIEND OF TRUSTS.

Workingmen Declare He Is Hostile to Them and Mortgaged to Monopolies.

No workingman would support Depew for any office. He represents a class that is naturally opposed to the interests of the people. The New York Central strike showed him in his true colors. He is essentially the man of the corporations, and therefore the enemy of organized labor.

Organized labor, irrespective of political affiliations, is against the election of Dr. Chauncey M. Depew to the United States Senate. Labor leaders look upon him as a friend of the corporations.

WILLIAM J. O'BRIEN, president of the Board of Working Delegates: No workingman would support Depew for any office. He represents a class that is naturally opposed to the interests of the people.

J. QUINN, delegate of the Electrical Workers Union: If Depew were elected for an office in a popular election he would be defeated by the votes of the workingmen.

MATTHEW BARR, delegate of the Tin and Sheet Iron Workers Union: Depew is a man of labor to virtue of his connection with the New York Central Railroad.

GEORGE WASHINGTON JONES, delegate of the Clothing Cutters Union: I am opposed to Depew for United States Senator, and so, I believe, are all the workingmen of the Republic, and therefore a friend of corporations and monopolies.

TO AMERICANIZE CATHOLIC CHURCH.

No Title Such as "German" or "French" Catholics to Be Used Here.

IT IS THE POPE'S WISH.

Archbishop Corrigan Has Made the Announcement to the Priests of This Diocese.

AN OLD CONTENTION SETTLED.

No Hasty Action Contemplated, but the Purpose Sure to Be Accomplished in the End.

A most important step is under consideration by Roman Catholic prelates in this country—viz., the Americanizing of the church, or, in other words, putting an end to the custom of establishing on American soil Catholic churches which retain the names and languages, outside of the Latin ritual, of the countries from which their parishioners have emigrated.

The work will be done, said Father Lavelle, speaking for Archbishop Corrigan, "slowly and gently—almost imperceptibly; but it will be none the less a permanent accomplishment."

The American idea was championed by Father Hecker, Archbishop Keane and other prelates favorable to the growth of the church in this country along lines agreeable to the general sentiment of the country. The most obstinate objectors have it is said, been the Catholics of German birth or descent who have their own churches and schools in which the mother tongue is exclusively spoken and taught.
