CAVAL PROJECT A FEASIBLE ONE.

Commissioner's Report So Demonstrates, Says Senator Morgan.

HE HAS AN ADVANCE COPY.

It Shows Three Routes, by Any One of Which the Waterway Can Be Constructed.

Washington, Dec. 28.—Copies of the preliminary report of the Nicaragua Canal Commission, of which Admiral Walker is chairman, have been furnished to Senator Morgan and others interested in the bill now pending in Congress on that subject.

The Commission has not yet fully worked out all the details of construction of the proposed canal. The report presents briefly the views of the Commissioners as to the feasibility of the work and the maximum cost at which it is believed the waterway can be constructed.

Three routes are spoken of, viz.—the old low level, the high level or Menocal route, and an intermediate route. Any of these, Senator Morgan says, the Commission considers feasible of construction.

For the purpose of arriving at an estimate of probable maximum cost, the Commission submitted figures on the low level route, which the Senator says is considered the longest and most expensive. For this route, Admiral Walker estimated the cost would be \$124,000,000; Professor Hays, \$123,000,000, while General Haines added twenty per cent to those figures, because of various conditions, chiefly the question of the cost of labor, which it was impossible, he thought, to figure on with absolute definiteness.

The report, says the Senator, shows conclusively that the project is an entirely feasible one, and that in its construction the Government has the choice of any one of the three routes. It shows, further, Senator Morgan stated, the absolute accuracy of the survey made by Engineer Menocal some years ago.

The Senator believes, however, that all these figures are too high, and expresses the opinion that \$100,000,000 will cover the entire cost of construction, basing this belief on what has been done in the case of the Manchester, the Kiel and the Chicago Drainage canals, and on the reduced cost of materials and labor to-day as compared with what have been necessary in the early discussion of the building of the proposed waterway.

STEAD RISES UP TO SUSTAIN THE CZAR.

Urges Christian Endeavors to Work for the Success of the Peace Congress.

Boston, Dec. 28.—The United Society of Christian Endeavor has received the following message from Editor William T. Stead, of London, for the Christian Endeavors of the world:

"The year 1898 brings with it a great opportunity. In the last nine years Christian governments have spent upon armaments for war a sum far exceeding \$5,000,000,000. To abate this gigantic waste of the resources of civilization, the Russian Emperor has summoned all governments to a conference. That conference will fall unless vigorously supported by demonstrations of enthusiastic approval all around the world.

"I appeal to the Christian Endeavors to do their part in evoking that enthusiasm and in giving it practical shape. Now is the time to meet, and the society be converted into a local peace committee, and undertake the duty of getting up steam for the peace conference. Otherwise the great opportunity for the falling of the great opportunity may rest on your heads.

NAVY WILL RULE GUAM.

The Far-off Island is Not to Have a Military Governor.

Washington, Dec. 28.—The Island of Guam will be different from the other colonial possessions or dependencies of the United States in having a naval instead of a military governor.

The reason is that the sole motive in the selection and acquisition of this island was to obtain a naval station for our war ships. The island has a population of more than 5,000 people, and so far from these being barbarians, about 1,400 of them are of European extraction.

HERE'S A QUEER OFFER.

Church Will Admit He's a Murderer to Get Back to California.

Columbus, O., Dec. 28.—Harry Church, whom the police suspect of being James C. Dunham, the man who murdered a family of six near San Jose, Cal., in 1896, said today:

"I will plead guilty to being Dunham, if they pay about \$40 I owe in this city and take my wife and me back to California, where I want to go; for they will soon see here that I am the man wanted and turn me loose in the place where I want to be."

BIG CARGO OF OPIUM.

Largest Ever Brought Into San Francisco—Duty Is \$162,360.

San Francisco, Dec. 28.—The steamer China, just arrived from the Orient, carried the largest consignment of opium ever entered at this port.

There were 690 cases of the drug, valued at \$500,000. The total weight of the opium is 27,000 pounds, and the duty on it amounts to \$162,360, at \$6 a pound.

STOLE HER KISSES.

Annie Schubert Calls Her Sweetheart a Persistent Pilferer.

VERY EXPENSIVE VISITS.

Edward Davenport Arrested on a Charge of Constantly Robbing His Fiancee.

Edward Davenport stands accused of persistently robbing his sweetheart, Miss Annie Schubert, his last alleged offense being the abstraction of a \$5 bill from a toy bank at her home, No. 117 Bloomfield street, Hoboken, on Tuesday afternoon. Yesterday he was arraigned before Recorder Stanton and held for further examination.

Davenport, a clean shaven fellow of twenty-four, says he is an acrobat, and lives at No. 319 East Fourteenth street, New York. Miss Schubert is a cousin of ex-Chairman of the Common Council J. Henry Timken. She is eighteen years old, and acts as housekeeper for her father and two brothers.

On December 20 she called on Captain Hayes at police headquarters and reported that on seven different occasions money and articles of value had been stolen from her home. The captain questioned her closely, and brought out the fact that some of the articles taken had disappeared on the days her sweetheart visited her. "Say nothing of this to him," cautioned the captain, "but keep a watch when he calls upon you."

Some days afterward Miss Schubert again called on Captain Hayes. Davenport had called at her home on the night before and when he left, \$1, which was in a toy bank on the dining room mantel and a small gold ring which lay beside it were missing. Miss Schubert was told to continue her watch and to place a marked \$1 and \$5 bill in the little bank. Tuesday afternoon Davenport called upon Miss Schubert, and was left alone in the room upon the mantelpiece of which rested the toy bank containing the marked bills. When she returned from the room she looked into the bank. The \$5 bill was gone. Then she sent a messenger for a detective, all the while chatting gaily with Davenport. The officer came, Davenport was arrested and the marked \$5 bill was found in one of his pockets.

Yesterday Miss Schubert told Recorder Stanton that she and Davenport were to have been married next month. She also testified that she believed that two watches, one owned by her brother, the other by Miss Louise Barclay, a friend, and about \$16 had been taken by Davenport.

Further examination in the case was adjourned until today, ball being fixed at \$1,000, in default of which Davenport was locked up. A list containing the names of a number of young women, which was found upon Davenport, is now being investigated by the police, as it is thought that his visits to the rooms above have been equally expensive to them as those to Miss Schubert are alleged to have been to her.

PRESENT PRISON LABOR SYSTEM INDORSED.

State Commission and Assembly Committee Will Recommend That It Be Continued.

Albany, Dec. 28.—The State Prison Commission will recommend a continuation of the present system of convict labor, and the special assembly committee appointed to investigate the operations of that system will indorse it.

The report of the Commission will recommend that boards of supervisors establish industries as provided in the Prison law, and will declare strongly against permitting any other kind of labor to be done by prisoners from the country at large.

The assembly committee will say that the labor representatives and manufacturers agree that not an instance of a man losing a job, of wages being reduced, or a factory being shut down, or of hours of labor being increased, because of the competition of prison work or of prison made goods had come to their knowledge.
