

FIRST MURDER OF A CRIPPLE CREEK

Boy Finds His Father and Stepmother Dead When He Awakes.

ONE REVOLVER FOR BOTH.

After Seeing the Old Year Out, James Shuttleton Kills His Wife and Himself.

NO ONE HEARD THE TWO SHOTS.

Merry-makers in a Monroe Street Tenement Unaware of the Tragedy Which Had Taken Place in Their Neighbor's Rooms.

Willie Shuttleton, a lad of fifteen years, saw the arrival of 1899 and then slept soundly in his bunk in a closet next to the kitchen until long after 10 o'clock yesterday morning. When he awoke and looked into the next room he had the tableau which told him that the first murder of the new year had left him an orphan.

His stepmother was seated where he had last seen her, in a rocking chair by the kitchen stove, but she was dead, and there was blood upon her pretty, curling hair. Half sitting, half lying on the floor was his father, dead also. His head rested in the woman's lap and there was a bullet hole in the right temple. His father's short pipe and a revolver lay on the floor.

The boy went out and called the police to No. 207 Monroe street, where the family lived in three rooms on the second floor, and told them all he knew of the tragedy. "My father, James Shuttleton," said the boy, "was forty-two years old, a Scotchman from Arrahire. My own mother is dead, and this is my stepmother, Elizabeth, thirty-five years old. They had quarrels at times, but I never saw my father strike her. Last night we all sat up till after 3 o'clock. They drank some beer, but I saw no signs of it on either of them. At 1 o'clock father recognized his wife, held her there, just as she is now, with the blanket about her knees reading. Father called to her to go to bed. She would not go and said she wanted to sit up longer. Then I went to bed. I heard nothing after that. No pistol shots. Father was undressed and in bed when I saw him last. He had a bullet hole in the right temple, and worked in Bell & Pile's foundry in Brooklyn. He held off all last week.

The dead man was fully clothed, except that his feet were bare. He apparently had dressed, lighted his pipe and sat in a chair by his wife's side. Whatever she talked of, it ended apparently in his going to the bedroom for his revolver. Returning, it seems, he stood behind his wife, held a pistol close to her head behind the left ear and fired one shot, which came out through her mouth. Then he turned, pistol upon himself and fired at his head, resting against her body. No one in the house heard the two shots. There was merry-making in the other rooms all night and all day yesterday. The ambulance surgeon, whom the policemen called from Governor Hospital, recognized Shuttleton as a patient who had been recently under his care for alcoholism. His brother, who works in the same foundry, told Coroner East that there never had been serious differences in the family.

CRIPPLE CREEK USES LIGHTNING TO GET GOLD.

Big Increase in the Output of Ore-Bearing Quartz Due to the Adoption of Electricity.

Colorado Springs, Jan. 1.—Cripple Creek's 1898 gold output was \$15,001,922, against \$12,500,000 for 1897. The tonnage yield was 401,500. Smelters treated 100,000 tons, with an average value of \$65. The remainder, known as low grade ore, was worth from \$8 to \$20 a ton and was treated by chlorination and stamp and other reduction processes. Beginning at \$200,000 in 1891, the camp has put out \$55,248,922.

DIED THE DAY BEFORE HE GOT HIS FORTUNE.

A Premature Celebration Carries Off a Laborer Who Was Left Ten Thousand Dollars.

By the terms of the will of his lately deceased aunt, Patrick Donohue, a laborer, thirty-three years of age, living at No. 416 East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, and single, was to receive \$5 a week, and in case into possession of the principal amounting \$8,000 or \$10,000, on January 1, 1899.

On Saturday night Donohue started in to celebrate. Late at night he visited his friend, John Sullivan, at One Hundred and Twenty-third street and Eighth avenue. He was so much under the influence of liquor that he could not go home, and sat down in a chair to sleep. At 3 o'clock yesterday morning he was found dead in the chair, death having resulted from alcoholism. The coroner will hold an inquest.



Lawyers in Johnston Building Protest Against the Firm's Sudden Expansion.

BANK CHECKS ON SOUND BASIS.

Clearing House Balances Show That There is Less "Kiting" of Paper Obligations.

The most remarkable fact indicated by the year's business of the banks was the increase in balances as shown by the Clearing House statement. In 1898, when the exchanges reached \$400,000,000, the balances were only \$173,659,349, while this year, when the actual exchanges were only \$42,000,000, the balances were \$2,418,016,567.

Such, in brief, is the substance of a set of fireproof resolutions passed at a mass meeting held in the office of Davenport & Bull Saturday afternoon. In attendance at the meeting, besides the members of the Davenport & Bull firm, were William B. Bronk, William Strauss, Felix Jellinek and Charles Kallbelsch.

William B. Bronk was the chairman of a mass meeting, also the loudest and most principal orator. An ultimatum was sent to the Johnston estate, owner of the building, setting forth that if the eleventh floor is going to be a Guggenheim floor the other tenants demand cancellation of their leases and expenses of moving.

The protesting firms occupy one side of a hallway in the building. The firm of M. Guggenheim's Sons occupy all the offices on the other side of the hallway. Recently M. Guggenheim's Sons accumulated the current fund of expansion on the other side of the hall knew the whole front of the M. Guggenheim's Sons offices were ripped out and the Guggenheims were doing business in plain sight of the whole camp as it passed and repassed through the hallway.
