Wells, who is principal of the House of the Good Shepherd yesterday because she persists in running away from the home of her aunt, and Helen Johnson, of No. 373 West One Hundred and Twenty-third street, with whom she lived, also preferred going to the institution rather than her home.

#### Her Mother Calls at the Hospital, and After a Tearful Greeting Takes Her Away.

Miss Henrietta Wechsler was taken to her home in Brooklyn yesterday from the private sanitarium of Dr. Schroeder, in East Fifth street.

His wife was with him all yesterday. Her faith in him is unshaken, and she firmly believes he is being made a scapegoat in the case.

### HOODLUMS CLOSE A TAILOR'S FACTORY

#### Attack the Employes and Terrorize Them Into Idleness.

The tailoring factory of Samuel Glass at No. 297 Wallabout street, Brooklyn, which employs eighty-five persons, seventeen of whom are women, had to close yesterday at noon because hoodlums prevented the workpeople from returning to the building.

Proprietor Glass made an appeal to the police for protection, but he says, they failed to give it, so he headed a committee of twelve of his men and called at the Journal office and started his case.

The wounded men on the committee were: SAMUEL BASSOLOFF, two black eyes; SAMUEL BODLER, whiskers pulled out; MOSES FEHRSTEIN, fingers wounded with a time; cut sewed up by a doctor.

ISRAEL DOKNYETZ, No. 136 Varet street, beat out with a stone.

LOUIS PRINZ, nose damaged with a stone.

MATTIAS GEVAENTZ, left ear cut nearly off.

ISAAC DEUTSCH, struck in right side with a brick.

WILLIAM AARONSON, No. 159 Harrison ave., was kicked in the stomach.

The others had suffered minor injuries, but all of them were so terrorized by the hoodlums that they were afraid to go back to the factory. Proprietor Glass made the following statement:

"My business has suffered seriously by reason of the reign of terror that prevails around the building. At the noon hour a crowd of fifty or sixty boys and half-grown men wait for my employes at the corner of Throop avenue and Wallabout street, armed with sticks and stones, and attack them.

"The hoodlums make a special point in annoying the men who wear beards. I have seventeen men in my factory with grey whiskers and these suffer most. They are old and infirm and cannot protect themselves.

"The persecution has been going on for six weeks. A short time ago we called at the Clymer street police station and appealed to the sergeant there. He sent a detective to watch the factory but the detective made friends with the hoodlums and arrested no one. Then we swore out a warrant against a man who had beaten one of my tailors, as we did not know his name we put John Doe in the warrant, and though we pointed out the man to the police they would not catch him.

"We come to the Journal office because the Journal is a public spirited newspaper and stands up for the workingmen. We have seen so many instances where the Journal has helped the poor that we know it will do something for us.

"Of course, it may seem funny to the police that my men have their whiskers pulled out and are scared to death. I took five of my men with black eyes and bandaged heads to show to Captain J. A. Conyn, at the Clymer street station. He looked at them and said that he'd see we were protected, but he did nothing."
