

This Shows what a "Splint" Is.

A "splint" such as the crack three-year-old of the year, John Rowand, is now troubled with, is a honey growth or enlargement generally situated on the inside of the foreleg some four inches below the knee. When situated close to the knee joint, so that it may interfere with the joint, or placed far back on the cannon bone, so as to interrupt the free play of the tendon, a "splint" is most dangerous to a race-horse.
